HORRIBLE MURDER.

On Wednesday evening between the hours of 7 and 8 o'clock, a party of five men with their faces blackened, all armed, entered the house of Mr. Patrick Shine, a respectable and opulent farmer living at Carrizaperson, in the South liberties of this City. Immediately on their entrance, they demanded fire-arms, upon which the daughter of Mr. Shine ran out to the stable, and informed her father that robbers were in the house. Mr. Shine hurried back into his house, accompanied by two servant boys. On his entrance he was instantly shot by one of the party in the right breast, when he fell, exclaiming "I am a dead man!" His wife instantly threw herself on the wounded body of her husband, when another of the villains placed a musket to his left side, in spite of the distracted woman, and discharged the contents therein. So close was Mrs. Shine's face to the musket that her features were severely burned by the flash of the powder. One of the servant boys was knocked senseless upon the floor by a blow with a large horse pistol, on entering the house immediately after his master. The other servant boy made a desperate resistance, but was ultimately overpowered and thrown into a room, when the murderers made off. The whole of this dreadful outrage was the work of a few minutes. The party left behind a small old rifle-barrelled pistol, the stock of a large horse-pistol, and a glazed cap. Sir Richard Franklin, John Crips, Esq. and Sub-inspector Williams, the next morning visited the scene of outrage, and every exertion is since being made to bring the perpetrators of this bloody deed to justice.

In the afternoon of Thursday, James Bennett, Esq. Coroner, held an inquest upon the body of deceased, when after examining his afflicted widow, daughter, and two servant boys, each a witness of the tragic scene, the jury returned a verdict of "wilful murder" against persons whose description it would not be prudent to publish at present.

Monday last, Denis Roughan, of Ballyvarra, who had recently entered the service of Mr. Waller, of Castle Waller, Newport, as wood-ranger, was barbarously murdered, while employed protecting his master's property, by some fellows who had been plundering the timber, and who almost literally cut the head off their victim, and then mangled his lifeless body with strokes of a hatchet. Roughan's only offence was fidelity to his employer.
