In this hurried sketch it is impossible for us to estimate the amount of damage or injury sustained, but from all we have seen and heard, it must amount to an immense sum, as scarcely a house has escaped uninjured, the windows, roofs and chimneys, being broken and damaged either wholly or partially.
 The large chimney of the Fever Hospital fell in and took down part of the roof, a heap of rubbish being thrown at the very feet of the patients' beds.
 The chimney of Capt. Stotherd's house in Mallow-street fell in, bringing down the roof of that and Mrs. Vize's house adjoining, but providentially both families escaped injury. The splendid stores of John N. Russell, Esq. suffered much on the roofing, many yards of slating at the west gables having been wholly torn away by the fury of the storm.
 An inquest was held on the bodies of the two females, Mary Smith and Hanah Shea, at the Exchange, and a verdict of "accidental death," returned.
 In the Liberties of the City several farmers houses are unroofed, and cabins prostrated to the ground; while the number of trees uprooted in gentlemen's demesnes is said to be immense.
 The embankment below the North Strand is torn up, and the fields are flooded for miles inland. The Long Pavement is also covered, and a man of the name of Patt. Hassett was drowned this day, whilst looking for his cow in the fields.
 Between three and four this afternoon, the squalls of wind direct from the North, preceded by showers of hail and sleet, rocked some of the firmest houses, but, happily, did not long continue.
 A singular accident occurred to the Dublin Mail this morning near Bird-hill, when the driver was blown off his seat upon the road by a gust of wind, but the coach and horses proceeded on for two miles without interruption, until Counsellor Reid, one of the passengers, sprung off, and arrested their career on the very brink of a dyke. No injury happened beyond a slight hurt to the driver.
 This destructive tempest has been similar in its character to that of 6th January, 1839, which inflicted damage upon houses and shipping in Limerick to the amount of near £20,000. The ravages of this day, we hope, are not so extensive, nor the loss of life so great as at that memorable period.
 We have only to add that no port in Ireland is so exposed as Limerick to the flush or swell of a western tide, for want of a Breakwater, for which there is an eligible site immediately below Meade's-quay, and the Board of Works in mercy to the lives and property of the public should look to this. After the vast expenditure on this port, and the great increase in port dues, there is no safety harbour provided for shipping, where it is most wanted, of any part of the Shannon.
