**FUNERAL OF THE LATE D. BARRINGTON, ESQ.**

Yesterday the remains of this much regretted gentleman arrived from Dublin, for interment in the family vault, at the Cathedral of this city; the melancholy cortege was met at Birdhill about eleven o'clock, by a numerous and most respectable body of his relatives and friends, an immense number of his tenantry on horseback, as well as those of the estates for which he was agent, were marshalled four deep by Mr. Larkin, and supplied with scarfs and hat-bands, the procession then moved on in the following order:—

**THE HEARSE**

drawn by six horses, and followed by three mourning carriages belonging to the family of the deceased, and containing the chief mourners, Croker Barrington and Thomas Williams, Esqrs., next came the Congregated Trades of the city, who had assembled to pay the last sad tribute of respect to the memory of one who had on all occasions been a warm friend to their interests. The banners of the several guilds were enveloped in crape, and borne before the masters and wardens in the following order:—Masons, Stonecutters, Bricklayers, Sawyers, Slaters and Plaisterers, Carpenters, House Painters, Linen and Cotton Weavers, Coopers, Founderers, Bakers, Woolcombers, Ropemakers, the Abbey Fishermen, Sandmen, Pilots, Tobacconists, Blacksmiths, Cabinet-makers, Tallow-chandlers, Shipwrights, Wheelwrights, Cordwainers, Pipe-makers, Coach-makers, and Brogue-makers. Among the equipages which followed in a line extending over a mile, we noticed those of Sir Joseph Barrington, Bart. Dean Hartigan, Michael Furnell, Esq. D.L. Sir Richard Franklin, Wm. Howly, Esq. D.L. Henry Watson, Esq. Mrs. Mahony, C. Delmege, Esq. Dr. Gelston, Peter O'Brien, Esq. Dr. Knight Carey, T. P. Vokes, Esq. Richard Russell, Esq. Mrs. Colonel O'Donnell, Connell FitzGerald, Esq. The horsemen, of whom there could not have been less than two thousand present, closed the procession, which passed thro' Clare-st, Charlotte's-quay and over the New Bridge to the Cathedral. The Mayor, officers, and the members of the Town Council joined the cortege at Clare-street, and accompanied it to the church. The coffin was then brought into the aisle, and the anthems, &c. of the funeral service, were sung in a most effective and masterly style, the solemn notes of the organ reverberating thro the sacred edifice in unison with the voices of the choir, led by Mr. Ranelow. The beautifully impressive lessons appointed in the liturgy for the burial of the dead, were then read by the Rev. Michael Keating and Rev. Henry Gubbins, at the conclusion of which the Dead March in Saul, was solemnly performed on the organ, and the coffin was deposited in the vault, amidst the tears of his relatives and of a numerous circle of domestics and others, by whom his loss is severely felt, and who will long remember his many kind, affectionate, and generous qualities.
