James Hickie, charged as a principal in the murder of Mr. Patrick Shine, of Carrigaparron, near this city, has been secured at Roscréa, by the vigilance of Sub Inspector J. Morgan, and the Police under his command.

On Thursday an inquest was held at Clarina on the body of Margaret Morrisy, Lord Clarina, T. P. Vokes, Esq. and James Bennett, Esq. Coroner, pre- siding. She had been missing since the 6th of February last. Verdict—"We find that she was last seen in good health on the evening of Sunday, the 6th of February last, in company with Patrick Naughton and Thomas Naughton, near the river Mague, and that her dead body was found in said river on the 16th inst." The two Naughtons' were apprehended, and kept in custody by Mr. Vokes since this young woman was missed.

Arrested by Sub-constable William Keefe, Denis Collins, and John Coakly, of the Ballina station, a most noted character who calls himself William Kelly, from the county of Clare, who was armed with a gun powder-horn and some slugs, at Mr. Thomas Kent's gate at Ballymalone near Ballina; he thought to make his escape but they succeeded in arresting him. Mr. Kent was attacked by an armed party on the night of the 21st ult., who beat him in a most brutal manner for not giving up an acre and a half of land he had taken two years previous to the occurrence.

On Sunday evening, a riot took place in a public house in the village of Feenaugh, when Thos. Cronin, one of the party, received a blow from a stone on the head, which fractured his skull, of which he lies dangerously ill. The Kilmeedy police when apprized of the outrage, succeeded in arresting Jas. M'Eniry and Thos. Lynch, the latter charged with inflicting the blow; they were committed for further examina- tion by Capt. Shelton.
