Now, we distinctly told him the object of our visit on our introduction which was, to disclaim any religious connection with persons, who in the present day are going about the country, bearing our name, and whose conduct has been termed fanatical—and having given him two of our Tracts, explanatory of our Doctrines, which he promised to read, we were about to retire when he said, that if consistent with his duty, he would rather refrain from preaching as he intended to do, and we think, added, that it was not his wish to offend us, or any people. In reply, he was told, not to mistake the purport of our visit, for that "if raising a little finger by one of us, would prevent his preaching, we would not do so"—and as to the "Sermon," all we had to remark concerning it, was, to request it might be published, or that a copy of it might be given to us. So much then for the variety of inducement or "threats" to prevent the intended exposition of our opinions.

John Elms has stated in two instances, of having our sentiments under our hands, or to this import—a little explanation seems necessary with respect to this. We called at his house about 11 o'clock in the forenoon, and having informed him through a member of his family, of the nature of our visit, he appointed 2 o'clock in the afternoon for the interview; we went accordingly and having as before stated, accomplished the object of our visit, and about to take leave, we then found that a number of queries had been prepared for us, and of such a character, as fully exhibited his total ignorance of our principles; one of them relating to ministry and worship, we declined to answer, until repeatedly pressed to do so, and then on the express understanding that no offence would be taken at our conscientious reply; as many more were replied to, as was considered necessary for the elucidating of our views as a christian people, previously denying his right to catechise us, and assuring him, that we came not for controversy, nor had any desire to enter upon it. The replies he received were, (as well as we remember) taken down by himself, he has been since solicited by one of us, for a copy of all the queries put to us, with the answers appended to such as were replied to, but these we have not yet been able to procure from him, for this reason—that he declines to communicate with the friend who made the application, because he did not give him the title of "Reverend," and which in declining to do, he was assured was not intended as offence, but as that appellation is only given in Scripture, to the Almighty, should not be bestowed on any of his creatures.—See c.x.i. Psalm i.x. Verse.

"Those who judge of the writings of the first Friends by modern standards of literary excellence and courtesy, are apt to censure them for their severity. Much, however, may be said in extenuation of them. Friends were particularly obnoxious to the clergy of that day, in consequence of their unyielding opposition to a ministry of human appointment, to the system of tythes, and a forced maintenance." "Hence the imprisonment of Robert Barclay, and thousands of his friends, immured for years in loathsome jails and filthy dungeons, by which about 300 lost their lives; many were most cruelly flogged, and had their properties confiscated or swept away for Tythes, and costs of Ecclesiastical suits, which reduced their families to distress and poverty; whilst others were banished the kingdom. "Harrassed by such unchristian conduct, and smarting under such cruel persecution, they must have been more than human if the weakness of nature had never betrayed them into an unguarded or intemperate expression."* In conclusion, we wish to say that we consider it not "doing justly," as the Scriptures imperatively enjoin, to attack George Fox or any other person, from the writings of his opponent, and particularly of one who has misrepresented and perverted his doctrine; and we look on such a line of proceeding, as utterly at variance with our Lord's command of "whatsoever ye would that men should do unto you, do ye even so to them."
