SAVAGE MURDER.

A fine young man, named Patrick Walsh, was found bathed in blood, at an early hour on Sunday evening last, in a cart, the horse of which was straying along the road, at Coogba, Lord Stanley's estate, within a mile of the village of Doon, in this county, and less than half a mile of the Police station. He was speechless and smeared with gore, which also disfigured the cart. Surgeon Thomas Wilkinson, who was known to be in the neighbourhood was at once sent for, but life was extinct before his arrival. This gentleman who was examined at the inquest, deposed that death was caused by an extensive wound passing obliquely through the right eyebrow, exposing a fracture on the forehead, and through which the brain was visible. Head-constable Saunderson with the police parties from Doon and Cappamore, were indefatigable in searching the country for the last two nights, and happily succeeded in arresting one man, on whom strong suspicion of the murder rests, as his waistcoat was spotted with fresh blood, for which he could not satisfactorily account. The deceased was a resident of Ballycleave, county Tipperary, and on his way to Ballyvalode, near Ulla, when he was waylaid and murdered.

An attack was made on Michael Kenna, of Emly, and John Ryan Luke, of Bilboa, on the 2nd inst. These two men were sent by Hugh B. Bradshaw, Esq, of Phillipstown, near Cappawhite, to the lands of Ballyclare, near Keeper-hill, to settle with his tenants, who were three gales rent in arrear, on undertaking to pay only one! They were met near the above farm by two men, who were armed with guns, and who separately fired at them, when Ryan's hand was shot, and Kenna's wounded. The description of these assassins answered that of Edmond Ryan, better known as "Captain Steel-rib," of Lockabeg, near Bilboa, who was arrested by that active officer, Constable Connors, Castle Lloyd, but Knana said he was not able to identify him.

A post car lately established, and the property of Gerald O'Connor and Co., who reside within a short distance of Shanagolden, was attacked in the afternoon of the 6th inst. the fair day of Askeaton, by a party of men who threw stones at the passengers, and attempted to erect a parapet wall across the road to obstruct its way to Shanagolden.
