A man named William Hartigan was killed by falling over the area of Lord Limerick's residence, on Wednesday night while in a state of intoxication.

A woman named M'Coy, wife of a pensioner, in the Englishtown, was found dead in bed on Thursday morning. It appeared that the husband drew his quarter's pension on the preceding day and both retired to bed deeply intoxicated.

Six notorious characters, charged with various Whiteboy offences, were arrested a few nights ago, through the active exertions of that efficient Constable Serjeant Molloy, and a party of the Lackey Police.

A few nights ago a sheep, the property of George J. Bolster, of Patrick's-well, Esq. was killed on his land, and the hind part of the carcass taken away by some party unknown. A similar outrage was committed on the lands of Mr. Ievers, of Castle Ievers.

On Wednesday night, three men with their faces blackened were apprehended attacking a farmer's house, named Looby, in Tipperary, by Head Constable Mulholland and a party of the constabulary.

A herdsman of Mr. Smithwick of Bansha, was killed returning from the fair of Tipperary, by a fall from his horse.

The dwelling house of a man, name Higgins, living at Ballycleary, within a mile of Kinvarra, was maliciously set on fire on the night of the 2d inst., the family were all in bed, when the wicked act was perpetrated, fortunately no lives were lost.

At the Petty Sessions, yesterday, there was no case of importance investigated. A letter was read from Mr. Brewster, stating that the Police could not be employed in protecting the fishery. Mary Ryan, James Dooly, Thomas Fitzgerald, Edward Parker, and Joseph Joyce, were fined 5s. each, or 48 hours' imprisonment. Informations were ordered against Michael Hartigan, for embezzlement; and against Mary Conway, for robbery of wearing apparel belonging to Mary Briscoe. Several nuisance and trespass cases were disposed of. The case of Sheils against Smith, for a breach of contract on the Shannon Works, was dismissed and referred to Clonlara Petty Sessions, the works being on the Clare side of the Shannon.
