In Dublin, on Monday, Mr. Robert Connolly, for some time a
Preacher in the Wesleyan Methodist Society in this city. Few
men have passed into eternity more deeply and deservedly re-
gretted by a very extensive circle of friends than Mr. Connolly.
He was one of those whom nature peculiarly endows with the
various qualities of head and heart most calculated to gain esteem
and excite admiration. His manners in private life were marked
by all the cheerfulness of a true Christian, and the courtesy of a
gentleman, so that it was impossible to meet him in society with-
out feeling a desire to secure his friendship. He possessed ac-
tivities of the highest order, and a mind stored with varied and useful
knowledge, which was at all times employed in the cause of religion
and charity. As a public character in the religious Society with
which he became connected in early life, he was most generally
esteemed—not only for his piety and exertions in the spirit of
duty to which he considered himself called, but also for his
superior talent and distinguished eloquence in the pulpit. As a
platform speaker, he has been seldom surpassed, and many in
Limerick will long remember his persuasive and beautiful oratory
whenever he came forward to advocate the cause of our Protestant
Orphan Society or any other charity; but, perhaps, the best
proof of his ability, both as a speaker and a reasoner, was given on
occasion of the "Provincial College Meeting," in this city, when
he analysed with such force and success, that carried down
scheme, as to show clearly its dangerous character, to scatter it
heterogeneous members by the power of his superior intellect, and
to elicit unbounded applause, as well from its advocates, as from
its opponents. It is not too much to say that the Church of which
he was about becoming a Minister, has, by the mysterious provid-
ence of God, in removing him, suffered a severe loss: since it
was calculated both to adorn its precepts by his life, and advance
its interests by his abilities. His end was peace, for he died as if
lived a faithful follower of our blessed REDEEMER; resting on
on His merits, and pillowing his head on the bosom of Omnipot-
tence.
