

Mr. Doherty, of Muff, a most influential Roman Catholic of Derry, and a leading member of the Town Council, in his speech at the Mayoralty banquet, pointedly denounced the Repeal agitation as mischievous and absurd—the hobby of visionaries or raves—and destructive to the peace and prosperity of Ireland.

The foundation stone of the new city and county buildings at Glasgow, was on Friday laid by the Lord Provost, Sir James Campbell.

The new Corn Exchange erected in Hope-street, Glasgow, for the accommodation of those engaged in the grain trade, was opened on Wednesday last for the first time, when the respective stalls were taken possession of by their tenants, and a good dale of business transacted. Underneath the hall, is a large store, capable of containing 800 tons of grain.

The following appeared in part of our last impression: The Countess of Clare has arrived at Mivart's Hotel, in Hentlesham-hall, near Ipswich.

The Hamilton, a fine brig of 300 tons, was totally wrecked near Harwich on Tuesday, and out of her crew of 12, only one was saved: Captain Bradbury was among the drowned.

Three companies of the 91st have returned to the Cape from St. Helena. The 75th cannot return home for want of conveyance, as they were to have sailed in the Abercrombie Robinson, now a wreck.

Upwards of £200 is subscribed at the Cape of Good Hope, to purchase a sword for presentation to Major Smith, 27th, the gallant defender of Port Natal.

The Colonelcy of the 50th Regiment, and the Lieutenant Governorship of Chelsea Hospital, are vacant by the death of General Sir G. T. Walker, Bart. the deceased veteran, who was aged 78 years, distinguished himself highly at Vimiera, in overthrowing a French column, and was wounded severely at Badajos. The 58th has marched from Liverpool to Chatham. The 69th from Fermoy, is to replace the 58th in Dublin, the former being relieved at Fermoy by the 1st from Cork.

The Rectory of Moymet, Meath, worth £240 a-year vacant by the death of the Rev. G. Alley, is in the gift of the Lord Lieutenant.
