EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK GAZETTE.

SIR, I have read a letter on your Journal last, signed R. B. CORNEILL, referring to the contract for his Tender for Coals, at 21s. per Ton, instead of another at 24s. per Ton, by the Guardians of the Kilmallock Union, at 20s. per Ton, on the 2d ult. As Chairman of that meeting, I myself called upon to state that Mr. Corneill was rejected in consequence of its being reported to the Board by the Master of the house, that he was compelled at various occasions to return bad coals to Mr. Corneill, and that on other occasions he was obliged to receive coals of inferior quality, as having then no other alternative. The Board, which consisted of Ten other members, the Assistant-Commissioner, Mr. Gilbert, and they should not entertain any tender from Mr. Corneill, and they were obliged to accept of the Tender at 24s. per Ton, for best Wallsend Coals, delivered at Workhouse. With regard to the Tender at 20s., as set forth in said letter, I could not approve of it, as it did not contain any particulars of delivery of Coals, or other definite particulars.

I trust that those facts will show that the uncalled for Mr. Corneill's letter was not intended to misrepresent the proceedings of the Board, which on this, as well as on every other occasion, has discharged its duties.
