regret of his beloved family, George Purdon Drew, Esq. of Cool-
reaghmore, county Clare, and Ballygaddy, county Cork. He
served with distinction in the 70th and 45th Regts. for nearly
twenty years, and commanded the latter corps when eldest
Major. He was brother of Lieut.-Colonel Drew, Aide-de-Camp
to General Sir Ralph Abercrombie, and first cousin to the late
Dowager Marchioness of Donegal, and Sir John Godfrey, Bart.
Major Drew will long be remembered with esteem in this city,
for integrity, uprightness, and true notions of honour. He had
been a brave and active military man, and possessed a remarkably
cheerful disposition amidst the most trying scenes. This re-
spected veteran was great-grandson to the celebrated Earl of
Coningsby. His unassuming manners gained him the regard of
all classes. His end was peaceful, and full of hope in the mer-
cies of God, through his Redeemer.
