Easter Quarter Sessions commenced at Killaloe yesterday, before W. E. Major, Esq. Assistant-Barrister.

A fine boy, son of Simon Rose, Esq. of this City, narrowly escaped a severe wound, by some grains of shot which lodged in his face, by the incautious use of fire-arms, near Mount Catherine.

On Monday there were but three drunken commitments from our police-office, after the nights of Saturday and Sunday. The presiding magistrate, T. P. Vokes, Esq. granted informations against Margaret Roughan, a cyprian, for stealing a quantity of horse-cloth, the property of Mr. Harrison, of William-street, and against Mary O'Brien, and Catherine Moriarty, two notorious shop-lifters, for robbery of cloth from the establishment of Mr. James Hogan, George's-street.

A countryman of the name of Halpin, fell down stairs in a state of intoxication at a public house in Adare, on Monday, and was killed on the spot.

Friday night an attempt was made to assassinate Mr. Thady Kelly, at his house at Clenagh, near Newmarket-on-Fergus. He had been sitting in a chair in his bed room, and had just left to get into bed when a gun loaded with two bullets was discharged through the window, passed through the back of the chair, and lodged in the wall. The magistrates of the district will meet to-morrow, at Newmarket, to investigate this outrage, and to offer a reward for discovery of the guilty miscreants.—*See Advt.*

Sunday night an armed party attacked the house of Thomas Magrath, who took a small farm on the lands of Clonlaheen, five miles from Ennis, the property of Thomas Mahon, Esq. They broke in through a window, and the first intimation the inmates had of their presence, was one of the men in bed receiving a stab in the back, of a bayonet. Thomas Magrath his three sons and a servant boy, not only did they defend themselves from the assailants who entered the house, but made one of them a prisoner. Those outside finding their comrade would not be given up, set fire to the house with the hope of forcing those within to liberate him, but the brave fellows set the party at defiance, retained their prisoner, and saved some of the furniture, but the house was totally consumed.
