Miss Gardiner's portraiture of the heroine of the drama, Pauline, is too well known in Limerick to require comment. She was never a moment out of her part—but so perfectly absorbed in it that her very identity was lost sight of; and so admirably was the assumed identity sustained that the character only, and not the actress, was seen. It is this perfect merging of the natural in the assumed—it is that rare power by which the feelings and emotions of an imaginary being are made identical with our own—that constitutes the great charm of Miss Gardiner's Pauline. Madame Deschapelles by Miss C. Gardiner, and the stern, but good-natured, General Damas, by Mr. Gardiner, were admirably supported; as were also the other characters of the piece, by Messrs. O'Callaghan, Ryan, Taaffe, &c. The singing and dancing were excellent, and the "Widow Machree," by Mr. Ryan, has become a standing favourite. In the farce of "The Budget of Blunders," Mr. Gardiner's Paddy Rooney put the risible faculties of his auditory in frequent requisition. The husiness at present promises a successful season—a fact which proves that the dramatic taste of our citizens was not destroyed, but merely cloyed by the very unsavoury treats heretofore provided for the public.
