MURDER OF THE ADJUTANT OF THE FIFTH FUSILIERS.

We subjoin an account of this melancholy trans-
action from a private correspondent. It would mani-
festly be improper to offer any commentary upon the
simple facts of the case, until the result of the legal
investigation—which will, of course, at once be
entered upon—shall be made known. It may not,
however, be out of place to state that there is no
reason to suppose that the dreadful deed has been the
result of a mutinous spirit, or of any conspiracy or
combination; but that it was the act of a solitary
individual, and of such a nature as, we presume, will
now-a-days be classed under the fashionable denomi-
nation of monomania:—

Parsonstown, August 12.—Our barracks have again
alas! been the scene of a death, still more tragical
and to be lamented than that which so lately excited
the sympathies of the public. At about half-past four
yesterday (Friday) evening, on the adjutant's drill, a
man (I have not been able to learn his name) stepped
from the ranks and asked the adjutant, Mr. Mackey,
for leave to fall out for a couple of minutes. He got
leave, and retired to a quarry-pit that was near—for
they were exercising in the 'fourteen acres,' a large
field adjoining the barrack-yard—where he loaded his
piece with a ball cartridge; he then returned, and,
when he got within about five yards of Mr. Mackey,
deliberately aimed and shot him through the body;
the ball entered below the shoulder-blade and came
out under the seventh rib, and then lodged in a
soldier's knapsack, where its fatal course was pro-
videntially stopped. The murderer, immediately on
the dreadful act being committed, dropped his arms
and said, 'I give myself up, I don't want to run.'
The first intimation we had of it in the town was
Lieut. Forest, of the 5th, riding at a most tremendous
pace into the Duke-square, in search of Dr. Henderson
the Surgeon, and in such a state of agitation that he
could scarcely speak. Dr. Henderson, and also Dr.
Baker of this town, sprung on a car, and were on the
spot almost immediately; but the decree was passed,
he had not spoken a word from the time he received
the shot, and a few minutes after they arrived he
breathed his last, leaving a widow and five infant
helpless orphans to deplore his untimely end."—*Mail*.

[The unfortunate deceased was Sergeant-Major of
the 5th Fusiliers, and on the 3rd of August, 1840,
was appointed to a Commission in the 21st Fusiliers,
and in the same Gazette exchanged into his old corps,
since which he has served as Adjutant—he was a
native of Scotland—his murderer is a native of
England.]—*Ed. Lim. Chronicle*.
