Grand Junction Railway continue to pay a dividend at the rate of 10 per cent.

In the case of Fergus O'Connor v. the *Times* newspaper for libel, charging the plaintiff with fraud and perjury at the late Nottingham election, there was a verdict for plaintiff, 20s. damages; but Chief Justice Giffard refused to certify for costs.

On the motion of Town Councillor Reily, seconded by Mr. Gray, a resolution was passed at the Repeal Convention on Monday, that a splendid full length portrait of O'Connell, by Hogan, should be made and placed first in the Conciliation Hall and afterwards in the Regent's Park. Mr. Steele suggested that it should be painted by O'Connell presiding at Tara-hill.

This week, as compared with the preceding week, the Repeal fund showed a deficit of £700, and the present week exhibits a further falling off of £400—altogether a decline of more than ten shillings in the pound in a fortnight! The sum being £913.

The Commission, yesterday, Ellen Fulham was sentenced to six months' imprisonment, for stealing a watch from Counsellor Mackey, of Leeson-street. John Haly, charged with throwing vitriol on John Haly, was acquitted.

The indefatigable Apostle of Temperance was, we are told, to perceive, insulted in England for the first time since the commencement of his praiseworthy mission. It appears that a counter meeting was got up by brewers and other interested parties at a public-house, near London, where the Rev. Gentleman was engaged in administering the pledge, and some attempt was made to destroy the carriage in which he was seated. Notwithstanding the interruption his visit to London was eminently successful.

An investigation in Clonmel, on Monday, before Mr. Justice Greene, Knarlesboro and Blake, ordered by the Lord Lieutenant into the conduct of Sub-Inspector Clarke for insulting the Mayor of Clonmel, was a complete failure, the story arranged, by Mr. Clarke disclaiming in the most manner any intention of being disrespectful to the Mayor's Worship.
