The grenadiers of the 6th Regt. have left Chester, for Newtown, Montgomeryshire.

This day is the anniversary of the battle of Busaco, in 1810, where the following corps were engaged:—1st, 5th, 9th, 38th, 43d, 45th, 52d, 74th, 83d, 88th, and Rifle Brigade, who under the command of Lord Wellington completely repulsed Marshal Massena. The 45th and 88th made a splendid and decisive bayonet charge on Busaco heights. In his despatch the Duke says, "I assure you I never witnessed a more gallant attack than that made by the 88th and 45th." The 74th also distinguished itself. Lieut. R. Ouseley, 45th, a spirited young officer, a native of this city, fell at Busaco.

The Chelsea Out-pensioners resident in South Wales, Bath, Coventry, Leicester, Derby, Nottingham, Stafford, and Lincoln, are now placed under the control of Staff Officers.
