MURDER OF MR. PATRICK SHINE.

he Queen, at the prosecution of the Attorney-General v. Robert Houlahan and Patrick Noonan.

It will he recollected, that at the last Summer ssizes of Limerick these men were convicted of aving murdered Mr. Shine, at Carrigparson, on the 2th of January, 1842. They were defended by Mr. 'Shaughnessy and Mr. Coppinger, who made several pints at the trial, relating to the venue, which were eserved for the decision of the 12 Judges, by the arned Judge Jackson, before whom they were tried.

o give time for arguing those questions, the execuon was respited till the 20th Inst. Mr. O'Shaughnessy on this day opened the arguent on behalf of the prisoners. His first proposion was, that no evidence was given by the Crown to new that Carrickparson, where the murder was comitted, was within the county of Limerick where the enue was laid. The only evidence was that of the Vidow Shine and Sir Richard Franklin relative to enue; and the effect of this evidence was to show nat before the Corporation Act Carrickparson was ithin the Liberties of the City of Limerick. I: as, therefore, the duty of the Crown to shew not nly when the Corporate Act but the Boundary Act, and 4 Victoria, chapter 108 and 109, came into peration; for, until the election of a Town council, the Boundary Act did not come into peration. He then urged that the decision of the court of Queen's Bench, in the case of the Queen t the prosecution of Martin Honan v. Vereker, reorted in 4 v. in Law Reports, 382, in Trinity Term 842, established that up to that time the new Corpoation had no legal existence, it having nullified all he previous proceedings; that therefore the Boundary act could not have yet come into operation, and that Carrigparson being consequently in the county of the ity in January, 1812. according to Mellor's case, I l. & R. 144, it should have been alleged in the ndictment that the murder was committed in the ounty of the city, with a suggestion to the county. he learned Counsel thirdly argued that neither at the ime of the murder or now Carrigparson was in the ounty of Limerick; and that even if the Crown had iven evidence of the election of a Town Council, it rould not have availed them, on the ground that the Corporate Act had yet no legal operation in the ity of Limerick. To enforce this argument he irst relied on the decision of the Court of Queen's Bench in the Queen v. Vereker. The 44th secion of the Corporate Act declares that the Reviing Barristers shall be appointed in the October f the first year the act shall come into operation. he 45th sec. declares that the Burgess list shall be evised in the October of the first year, and the 60th ec. declares, that on the 25th of October, in the irst year, the Town Council shall be elected. In imerick, these proceedings were all had in Oct. 841, but the Queen's Bench decided that all these vere a nullity, and that they could not have been egally done until October, 1842, because no burgess vas qualified before the 31st of August, 1842. The earned counsel then insisted that the first year of the peration of the act would not have commenced until fter the 31st of August, 1842, unless the remedial ct 5th and 6th Vict. c. 46, passed the first of uly, 1842, gave it an earlier operation.
