The fleet of merchant vessels in port this week is so large, as to line the whole range of quays, from the Custom-house to Meade's quay, a distance of one English mile, and in most of the berths they form a breast work of three tier, side by side. This does not include several vessels laying at the North Strand side of the river. At the same period of the year before the Union there were not seven vesels in the port of Limerick loading and discharging!

Yesterday morning, one of the passenger cars from Ennis to this city, the property of Mr. Charles Carrig, broke down at Carnelly, and from the injuries received by the axle and springs, was incapacitated from proceeding further on the journey. There were eighteen on the car at the time the accident occurred, all of whom escaped unhurt. Some of them were accommodated with seats on the late car from Mr. Bourne's establishment, but the majority were compelled to wait until a car was had from Ennis, some hours after.

On Tuesday evening next Dr. Parker will deliver the first of a series of lectures on Christianity at the Philosophical & Literary Society House, Upper Glentworth-street. The popularity of Dr. P. as a public lecturer, has been evinced on former occasions in this city, and we are fully satisfied that his ensuing course will amply repay those who may attend. These lectures will be continued on every Tuesday and Friday evenings until concluded.

On the evening of the 1st November a serious riot took place in the town of Kilorlin, Kerry, which Constable John Morony was called on to quell, and in the act of doing so he was severely beaten and cut, and was obliged to draw his bayonet and fight his way through the mob in the effort to get free, having only one sub constable to assist him, however he succeeded in arresting three of the principals.

Mr. George Twiss went to get the rent or distrain lands on the bounds of Kerry and Cork during the last week, but fortunately he did not return by the same way, as there were a number of men waiting for him armed, with what intention need not be mentioned.

Bridget Fox, a poor woman, fell into a drain or dyke, swollen by the late rains at Ballygibba, near Kilmallock, and perished. James Bennett, Esq. coroner, held an inquest. Verdict—Accidental death.
