I most respectfully request the Catholic Clergy to announce these my sentiments in every locality in which there may possibly be Ribbonmen, or "Billy Smiths." I, in like manner, solicit them to add to my advice the weight of their venerated counsel and authority. There is another topic upon which I wish to address the people, and to offer them my earnest advice. It is the practice now beginning to grow up, of lighting Bonfires on one frivolous pretence or another. A foolish and dangerous custom, it can do no good, and may do a great deal of harm, even accidentally. Let there not be any repetition of that most absurd and senseless practice. This is my command—will you let me say it is my command? In Ulster particularly it ought to be avoided. I am sure that some of the Orangemen there consider it as a result—that is a decisive reason why it should not be repeated. No honest Repealer would insult a man! Every honest Repealer would conciliate the men of all parties!! Let there be nothing more of these bonfires in Ulster, or in any part of the Kingdom.

I cannot conclude without again offering to you my most cordial thanks for the universal peace and quiet which prevails. Let every man in every part of Ireland be tranquil and quiet, and conduct himself peaceably and loyally. Let him totally avoid any riot, tumult, or violence. Whatever may be the event of the pending trials, let every man stay at home in quietness, and be not tempted by anybody to any violation of the peace. Every man who is guilty of the slightest breach of the peace is an enemy to the Union, and of Ireland. This is my advice. No more Bonfires! No "Billy Smiths!" No Bonfires! Let peace, quiet, tranquillity, and within twelve months the Repeal of the Union will be at hand.

No application, by any person not here Licensed to keep Arms, will be heard unless the applicant produces a certificate of approval, signed by two Magistrates at Petty Sessions nearest the residence of the applicant, or in the absence of such certificate satisfactorily accounted for.
