CHRONICLE) are in receipt of Barbadoes to the 24th Nov. The right 85th, under Major French, from Quebec, by the Boyne transport at Barbadoes, and for Antigua, head-quarters. Staff Surgeon in medical charge. Major Waters, R.E. for Antigua. The left wing of the 85th was sent out by the Princess Royal and proceeded for Antigua. The Boyne was 36 days on the passage. A detachment will be stationed at Killaloe. The 33d is on the inquiry at the Police-office who pretended to affright in the *melee* at a house, from which the 61st pickets were sent. It was a raw lad of 14 years, only enlisted a few days before in the 33d in this garrison. No wonder the 33d could have used the expression. The 45th Reserve at Cork is sent from the Cape to Gibraltar, and the 30th daily from Cork from Halifax, having been relieved by the 33d from Barbadoes.

Our military readers were prepared by our last for the death of the oldest man, and one of the very best officers in the Army, General Lord Lynedoch, who was born in the Peninsular war, having especially distinguished himself at Barossa, as Sir Thomas Graham. He died on Monday night, in the 94th year of age, and the title, with £2000 a year, a pension attached thereto, expired with him, leaving no male issue. The deceased veteran did not enter the military service until he was 45 years of age. His first commission was that of Lieut.-Colonel of the 90th, or Perthshire Volunteers, raised in his native county, 10th Feb. 1794. He was Major, 26th Jan. 1797; Colonel, 90th, and Major-General, 25th Sept. 1803; Lieut.-General 25th Sept. 1803; General, 19th July, 1821; Colonel, 58th, 1823; of the 14th Regt. 6th Sept. 1826; Major-General of Dumbarton Castle, 1707. May 22d, 1829;

The Coast Guard station at Kilkee, under Mr. Baldwin, chief officer, is to be broken up on the 5th of March, and only two men left in charge. Mr. Baldwin proceeds on the coast guard service to Wicklow, and will be much regretted on leaving Kilkee, where his affable and gentlemanlike deportment was never observed to be incompatible with the strict discharge of his duty as a public officer.

The removal of the Coast Guard service will be a serious loss to Kilkee. The contraband trade on the western coast will, most likely, be revived, and pursued with energy, to the great detriment of the revenue, while, in a moral point of view, it must prejudice the hitherto sober and industrious character of the native population.

The Magistrates of Kilrush, enforcing the observance of the game laws, have ordered one offender to pay £5, or be imprisoned a month, which latter alternative was adopted:
