The Coast Guard station at Kilkee, under Mr. Baldwin, chief officer, is to be broken up on the 5th of March, and only two men left in charge. Mr. Baldwin proceeds on the coast guard service to Wicklow, and will be much regretted on leaving Kilkee, where his affable and gentlemanlike deport-

ment was never observed to be incompatible with the strict discharge of his duty as a public officer, The removal of the Coast Guard service will be a
