ORDER VENDERS.—In reply to a letter from the Venders, respecting the removal of the Gunpowder Magazine from Courtbrack to the Ordnance magazine, and the communication with Captain Fry, on the subject of an interview with Lord Downes, I am to acquaint you that Captain Fry will be pleased in complying with the wishes of the Magistrates and citizens of Limerick; and the present now proposed is—that the vendors of the Magazine in the city, are at liberty to draw from the Ordnance magazine on the 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, 11th, 13th, 15th, 17th, 19th, 21st, 23rd, 25th, 27th, 29th, and 31st of Mondays, Wednesdays, and Saturdays, from nine and eleven o'clock, in such quantities as may be regulated by the civil authorities.

Constable Daly was directed to convey the Magazine to the depot at Courtbrack, to the Ordnance Magazine, and to see that the vendors of the Magazine complied with the above.

Recommendation of Mr. Dickson, a resolution adopted, that a party of police should be sent to Carey's road, to afford protection to the Magazine, and then adjourned.

DEATHS.
 At Doonass Glebe, on Saturday, the 23d inst. of effusion on the brain, brought on by the prevailing epidemic, aged 71 years, the Rev. Thomas Westropp, A.M. for 21 years Rector of the united Parishes of Kiltanaha and Killokenedy, in the Diocese of Killaloe. In early life he was a much admired and popular preacher, and devoted himself to the labour of the pulpit with great energy; but for some years before his decease he was obliged to retire from the public discharge of the duties of his sacred profession, on account of an asthmatic affection, which rendered him unequal to their performance, and gradually enfeebled all his powers, mental and physical. He continued, however, to the last to take the deepest interest in the mode in which those duties were performed by the Clergymen appointed to officiate for him, and always enquired most anxiously about the attendance at Church, when unable to go there himself. He was through life a fond and affectionate husband and parent, a considerate and indulgent landlord, and a sincere and zealous friend. His mortal remains were committed to the ground on Wednesday morning, in Doonass Church-yard where his beloved wife had preceded him little more than a year before, followed to their last resting place by his family, tenants, parishioners, both Protestant and Roman Catholic, and numbers from various places, who, notwithstanding the earliness of the hour, and the intended privacy of the interment, collected to testify by their presence the esteem and regard universally entertained for the departed Clergyman.
