serious career of a cab, which the driver was impelling with no regard for human life. The Police should check this dangerous nuisance. An accident befel Mr. Fitzgerald, brother of Albert Fitzgerald, Esq. Muckeridge House, Youghal, whilst hunting with the Marquis of Waterford's hounds, near Carrigrohane, which had well nigh cost him his life. His leg was broken in a shocking manner. A few nights since the "Victoria" steam boat, at an anchor, the property of the Shannon Commissioners, which was used by Mr. M'Kenzie, contractor for the improvement of the River Shannon, was observed to be on fire. The alarm was instantly given. The military, police, and civilians were promptly on the spot; but notwithstanding their united exertions the boat became a prey to the devouring element, and was completely destroyed. The Lord Chancellor has appointed William Herbert Saunders, Esq. to the Commission of the Peace for the county of Cork. Sunday last, a respectable farmer Thomas Meredith, residing at the Oak, near Mountmelick, attended divine service in the church of Ballyfin, where he was seized with apoplexy, and in a few minutes expired. On Wednesday night, six sheep, the property of Thomas M'Bride, were maliciously killed on the lands of Killenure. The Poor Law Commissioners are determined to appoint district revisors and valuers. Mr. Scroope is to have £30 for revising the valuation of Nenagh union. A new street is being opened to the new Court-house of Nenagh. The Repeal agitators have given up their meetings at Mountrath. The public will not in any way be losers by the melting in of the old silver, arrangements having been made between the Government and the Banks of England and Ireland to that effect. A very large quantity of the new coinage has been sent off by railway to the different Branch Banks. Mr. Richard Maunsell Ardagh, counsel for the Suir Preservation Company, has succeeded in establishing, before the Commissioners of Public Works, Passage the point at which the harbour mouth of Waterford should be defined. Col. Maxwell and the officers of the 36th Regt. on Sunday entertained to dinner Sir Edward Blakeney and his staff, Gen. Wyndham and his Aid-de-Camp, Earl of Cardigan, with the general staff of the 1st and 2nd Divisions, and Heads of Departments at head-quarters, Dublin district Staff, Colonel Trevelyan, 60th, and Lieut. Lord Adolphus Vane, son of Lord Londonderry, has joined the Rifle Brigade, at Corfu, on appointment. There are 188 Admirals in the Royal Navy, of which number 18 are Irish; the rest are Scotch and English. In this period 14 Admirals are employed and one Commodore, all Scotch and English. At a meeting of the Clergymen of the Franciscan Order in Dublin, the Rev. E. Hogan, of Broad Lane Street, Cork, was elected Minister Provincial of the Irish Franciscan body, vacant by the demise of the late Rev. James Walsh, at Wexford. The Right Rev. Dr. Kennedy has returned to his residence in Park, Newmarket on Fergus, from Dublin, not having been examined on the part of the traversers of the State trials. A leopard in Van Amburgh's menagerie at Bolton was killed by his keeper on Sunday, when the man had been thrown into the wild beast's den. A splendid short-horned heifer weighing 8cwt. was sold this day in our market, at £2 2s. The heifer was sinking offal, to Mr. P. Lyddy, fed for Mr. Lyddy, of Kerry.
