Johanna Boyle, and Mary Shaughnessy, domestics at

The Railroad from Dublin to Cashel will be com-
menced in the next summer, and will be completed in
two years. The share list is filling rapidly in Dublin
(7,500 shares being already taken.) The provisional
committee, being desirous of affording to the Irish pro-
prietors an opportunity of evincing their interest in the
undertaking, have not allowed, as yet, any announce-
ment of it to appear in the English Papers. The Grand
