

...the late High Sheriff of Kerry, Mr. Pierce Mahony, jun. is not upon the Grand Jury panel this year. A leading member of the Kerry Grand Jury, was scarcely restrained at the present Assizes, from committing bodily violence upon his antagonist near the Grand Jury room, and it was found necessary to bind him over.

Mr. Pierce Mahony's financial report to the last Kerry Grand Jury is found to be erroneous, and has placed the present grand panel in much embarrassment. The county cess, it appears, is not equal to clear off the incumbrances, or meet present engagements.

The whole of the contract roads in Kerry amount to 1086 miles. Castletown road will be commenced immediately, as the Marquis of Lansdowne has paid up his subscription of £1,000.

At Clonmel assizes, Judge Ball decided that money or household furniture, maliciously consumed, are not presentable by a Grand Jury. Judge Ball was cheered by the crowds collected on his leaving the Court-house. There was no capital conviction.

In Sligo £1000 was returned by the Paymaster of the civil service, that sum being overpaid by the county. The annual county presentments were refused at Special Sessions by the Magistrates and rate-payers to the Cork Infirmary; and the admission of patients is therefore restricted to extreme cases.

Thomas, James, and Christopher Gilligan, brothers, tried at Tullamore for the murder of John Fuller, were found guilty of manslaughter, and sentenced by Chief Justice Doherty to be transported for life.

True bills were found by the Grand Jury at Tullamore assizes against Peter Doolan and John Gill, for the murder of the late Lord Norbury, and both pleaded Not Guilty, on arraignment. The trial is postponed by the Crown to next assizes.

The Tyrone Grand Jury dismissed one of the assistant county surveyors for fraud on the treasurer's office, and appropriating to himself funds for local works. Chief Justice Doherty and Judge Burton left Tullamore on Thursday for Maryboro'.

The important slander case of George Rutledge v. John Fair, for trial at Mayo Assizes, damages in the declaration £3000, was withdrawn at the suggestion of court, jury, and counsel. The parties are brothers-in-law, and of most respectable local connexions. The entire arose out of litigation for a large property. Plaintiff and defendant left the court friends, consenting to leave all matters to arbitration.

At Castlebar assizes, on Tuesday evening, Baron Leffroy passed sentence of death on a man named Fahy, found guilty of murder, and who is to be executed on the 20th of April.

The Command of Cork district has become vacant by the death of Major General Sir Octavius Carey, K.C.H., who died in London on Thursday last. Col. Napier, C. B. Assistant Adjutant-General at Belfast, will very likely succeed Col. Wade, as Deputy-Adjutant-General at head-quarters, Dublin.

Orders are received in this garrison to recruit for the 39th and 50th Regiments, distinguished by the late splendid victories in India. Major Stopford, 40th, who fell wounded by a matchlock ball, at Gwalior, immediately after saw his enemy bayoneted by a sergeant of the Regt. The 40th took 12 guns. A letter has been received from Major Stopford, announcing that he is going on favourably. The ball entered his breast and passed out under his shoulder.

Capt. Coddington, 40th, is recovering from the severe wound he sustained at Gwalior. Lieut. and Adjutant Orfeu Cavenagh, of the 4th Irregular Horse, who lost his leg in the action of Gwalior, is son of Dr. Cavenagh, of Wexford. Promotions in the Bengal presidency, consequent upon the death of Major-General Sir Joseph O'Halloran, G.C.B.—Lieut.-Col. J. Holbroow to be Colonel; Major H. Lawrence to be Lieut.-Colonel; Lieut.-Col. J. Clarkson, Majors Frederick and Folwhite, promoted.

The 10th Hussars are spoken of in military circles as likely to proceed for India. Lieut. and Brevet Captain Denis Downes, 30th Bengal Native Infantry, is promoted to be Captain of a company, vice Milner, deceased. Capt. S. Burt, Bengal Engineers, is appointed Major, vice Brevet Lt.-Col. E. Sanders, killed in action. Capt. J. Scott is appointed Major of the 1st Bengal Cavalry, vice Major Crommelin, killed in action.

Colonel Logan, 63d, at Madras, has two years leave of absence to England. Capt. Williams commands the Depot of the 27th at Naas, Major Fawkes being on leave, before embarking for the Cape next month, with Ensign Woodburn. Captain Watson commands the company of the 27th at Drogheda, to which Lt. Johnston is attached, with Ensign Herring. Lieut. Raines, R. A. commands the detachment of Artillery in Drogheda, in charge of two guns.

Ensign Hamilton, 27th, who has joined the Depot at Naas, from the service companies at the Cape, is about to retire from the service, Lieut. Hutton is also about to sell out, and Ensign Langley succeeds to the Lieutenancy. Capt. Spence's company 60th Rifles, is stationed at Waterford. Lieut. Roe, 3 sergeants, and 60 rank and file of the 60th Depot at Belturbet, have arrived from Dublin at Cork, in the Rhadamanthus, to embark there in the Resistance troop ship for Quebec. The 33d, 43d, and 52d drafts go out by the Resistance.

A detachment of the 85th, under Lieut. Maunsell, marched from Newbridge to Athy, to relieve a detachment of the 90th Depot. Two soldiers of the 89th Depot were tried at Clonmel assizes for burglary and robbery in the house of Abraham Grubb, Esq. and found guilty? Two officers of the 76th Regiment at Devonport are under arrest for several weeks, one of them being a junior officer, for carrying a challenge to a superior officer, which the latter had accepted, both having thus violated their duty.

The Royal Artillery last year received an augmentation of 300 rank and file, and this year will be increased by 100 more. Private George Jubie, 5th Fusiliers, for the murder of Adjutant Mackie, at Birr, is to be hanged on Wednesday, the 27th inst. Capt. Blacklin, of the Royals, has sailed to join the 1st Battalion at Gibraltar. Capt. Stokes, R.A. has been relieved at Ceylon, by Capt. Ellis, R.A. and will return to England.

In the last number of the London Medical Times there appears an article from Doctor Gore, of this City, in which a new mode of completely dissolving urinary calculi in the bladder by means of galvanic electricity, is proposed and advocated. This method "perfectly simple, free from pain and danger of any kind," will, no doubt, completely supersede the difficult operation of breaking up the stone by mechanical means, and the dangerous one of extracting it by the knife, which were the only processes resorted to until the present mode. One of the first medical authorities of the present day has stated that "if it proves completely successful, it will exhibit one of the greatest triumphs of scientific over mechanical medicine which has occurred for a long time." Dr. Gore's letter states that the mode of applying it "is exceedingly simple, and free from all risk or inconvenience." By this agency the late Sir Humphrey Davy was enabled to dissolve and dissipate the most refractory substances, and by it he discovered the metallic origin of lime, soda, and other alkaline and earthy products. We trust that this invention of our fellow-citizen may prove a benefit to mankind.
