

ing this young man and his family to London. The Court regretted this, but as it appeared the insolvent had taken goods without a prospect of paying for them, he should remain him for three months.

Thomas Bouchier, grocer, of Ennistimon, County Clare, was opposed on the part of Mr. Scanny of Pillane, Dublin, to whom he was indebted £19 9s.—However it appearing the petitioner was disposed to act honestly, the opposition was withdrawn, and the insolvent was discharged.

At half-past six o'clock the court was adjourned to next morning.

FRIDAY.

At ten o'clock Mr. Commissioner Farrell resumed the hearing of the city petitions.

William Dodd was opposed by William Gibson and Edward Gallery of Ennis, on the grounds that he was possessed of property sufficient to discharge his debts, and that matters had been omitted by him in filing his schedule. It was finally agreed that he should be discharged on appointing an assignee, and undertaking that if certain land held by his mother ever came into his possession, it should be liable for his debts.

John Molony, a contractor under the Shannon Commissioners, was opposed on behalf of 30 labourers whom he had not paid their wages. The Court ordered that his "Protection" should be withdrawn, and to remain in custody until he paid off every one of the labourers.

Dublin from London. The Pestonjee Bomanjee transport has arrived at Portsmouth, with the left wing of the 59th, from Barbadoes, under Captain Boughy.

The Apollo has sailed from Jamaica for Quebec with the 2d Battalion 60th Rifles.

Capt. Cole, Aid-de-Camp to the Lord Lieutenant, is shortly to exchange from the 69th Regt.

Lieut. Lloyd, appointed Staff officer of Pensioners at Maryborough, has seen much service, having served as a Volunteer in the 27th Regt. in the Peninsula, and for his gallantry was promoted in the 74th Regt. with which he served with much credit in various actions and affairs, and subsequently in America, where he was presented with a grant of land by the Governor of Prince Edward's Island, for his exertions in maintaining the peace of that colony.

Colonel Sir John Clerke, his Lady and family, have entered into occupation of the house prepared for them in Victoria-place, Tralee.

In an affray at Tralee, on Tuesday night, between several privates of the Royal, and some of the lower class townspeople, a man of the name of Daniel Shea was badly injured. The local magistrates and military authorities are resolved to investigate the facts.

Private Jubie, 5th Fusiliers, under sentence of death at Tullamore, for shooting his Adjutant, is reprieved for a fortnight.

Major Wood's and Capt. Tylden's companies, Royal Artillery, Dublin, supplied detachments this week to Londonderry, Cove of Cork, and Duncannon fort.

The General Palmer transport arrived at Barbadoes, from London, with detachments of the 1st, 60th, and 71st Regiments.

Capt. Miller has taken the command of the Depot company 10th, at Chatham.

Capt. Kelly, depot, 3d Buffs, at Chatham, was severely bruised by a fall from his horse at a hunt on Tuesday, and sustained fracture of the collar bone.

Private Webber, 57th, was flogged before the garrison of Chatham on Monday, for threatening to shoot Capt. Jackson, in command of the Depot of that Regt.

A proposal has been approved of, by the Court of Directors, for increasing the strength of the officers in the Indian army, by the addition of one captain to each regiment.

Capt. Nowlan, late 25th, paid a fine of 20s. at Union-hall, London, on Wednesday, for spitting at a lady.

Capt. France's Brenda won by a length the sweepstakes of £10 each, £100 added, at Northampton Military Steeple Chase on Wednesday, Capt. Scobell's Humbug, running second.

Lieut. Emery, R. N. is in charge of the Comet steamship at the Pool, vice Fraser, appointed to the Lucifer, at the same roomings.

Lieut. Chamberlain, R.N. has succeeded the late and lamented Lieut. Nicholls in the command of the Dwarf, war steam-ship, now lying in the Pool.

The Hamilton Revenue cruiser, Commander Triphook, came to anchor yesterday in the Pool from Kilrush.

The Court-martial on Mr. Hand, engineer of the Prometheus, Lieut. Commander Pasco, was held at Portsmouth on board the St. Vincent, 120 flag-ship, Rear-Admiral Hyde Parker, President. The charge was for gross neglect of duty by having allowed the water in one of the boilers to get considerably below its proper level, and for not having taken proper steps to arrest the mischief. The Court found him guilty, and adjudged—"that the prisoner be dismissed her Majesty's service."

A court martial was held at Jamaica on board H.M.S. Imaum, for the trial of Lieut. Phillips, of H.M. brig Ringdove, for being absent from his watch on deck; for coming on the quarter deck when under arrest smoking a cigar; for refusing to go below when ordered, and threatening violence to the marines, who were ordered to remove him; and lastly, a general charge of disrespect. The prisoner pleaded guilty. The sentence of the court was that Lieut. Phillips should be reprimanded, removed from his ship, and placed at the bottom of the list.

Mr. Penrose, Purser of the Polyphemus, war steamer, is committed at Malta, for forgeries to a large amount, by which officers of the 42d and 88th will suffer.

The Bromo, Dutch Government Steamer, Captain Vat den Broecke, has arrived at Falmouth. This splendid frigate-rigged ship, is 1200 tons burden, and the largest in the Dutch navy. The Bromo is armed with eight guns, two of which are long 80 pounders on pivots, and manned with a crew of 130 officers and men; has a large amount of presents on board from the Sovereign of the Netherlands to the Emperor of Japan. She put in for coals and water.

His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant has been pleased to appoint Captain Jenkins, County Inspector of Down, to be Resident Magistrate in the room of Hill Wilson Rowan, Esq. who has retired, Captain Jenkins was the oldest County Inspector in Ireland. Mr. Jenkins, the newly-appointed Stipendiary, will be removed to Nenagh, and Mr. O'Brien will be stationed in the county Down.

Sub-Inspector Cary, at Bruff, succeeded with a party of police, in arresting three persons from Hospitelle and Kiltely, named James Slattery, John Brien and Thomas M'Carthy, charged as being of the party who attacked and robbed the Cork and Charleville butchers, on their way to the fair of Kiltely.

Mr. Charles O'Dell, of Nenagh, is promoted to a Sub-Inspectorship of Police, to be stationed in Carlow.

At the annual general meeting of the Dublin and Kingstown Railroad Company, on Wednesday, the year's receipts were stated to be £45,255, being an increase of £2,854 over the former year. Nett profits of the last year, £16,189. The usual dividend of six per cent. was declared.

At Newtownbreda the new Presbyterian Church was opened for divine service by the Rev. Henry Cooke, L.L.D. on Sabbath last. The Rev. doctor preached.—The amount contributed was £80.

Ground has been obtained, at a nominal rent, for a new Presbyterian Church, for the Rev. J. W. Hunter's congregation, Belfast, from John Murphy, Esq. who has also headed a subscription list, by the donation of £100.

On Thursday, the Presbytery of Edinburgh met in St. John's church in that capital, when, after sermons by the Rev. Mr. Duff of South Leith, Rev. R. W. Fraser was inducted to the pastoral charge of that church and parish, in presence of a numerous attendance of parishioners, who subsequently welcomed their new clergyman. The appointment of Mr. Fraser, we anticipate, will prove one of the best that has been made in Edinburgh for a long period.—*Scottish Record.*

The Right Rev. Dr. Spencer, Lord Bishop of Jamaica, held his first ordination on Sunday, the 18th of February, in the Cathedral of Spanish Town.
