Mr Williams said, on a rough calculation, one hundred and twenty pounds weight of gunpowder was discovered, and observed that concealing the powder in Mr. Quinlan's cellar was the worst feature in the transaction, for it might have remained there, if the fire extended, until the house burnt down, and must thereby cause a teruntil the nouse burnt down, and must differely cause a terrible explosion. In order to prove the powder was the property of Mr. Myles, Mr. Williams produced an order from him, through Mr. William F. Byron, in four hours after the occurrence, to give him 4bs. of blasting Mr. Thomas Glover, who was one of the first at the

scene of danger, proved that when he called upon Mr. Myles to give him up the powder in the house, he did so—there was some of it in the shop, more up stairs in a bed-room, and the rest in jars and cannisters in the shop; the powder found by Mr. Williams in his possession, belonged to Mr. Myles, and was after being removed from the concerns.

Mr. James Morris affirmed, that shortly after four o'clock, on Thursday morning, he was called by his wife, who told him that she believed there was a fire in James Myles's house; he got up, and before he left his own house made arrangements for the supply of water; on going into the street, he saw young Glover coming out of Myles's with powder on his back, which induced him to go into the house, but could scarcely see anything with smoke; he returned to the street, to have the fire plug prepared against the engine would arrive; on entering the house against the engine would arrive; on entering the house a second time, he saw a cupboard on fire in the parlour, which was only partitioned off from the shop; the cupboard was about 20 feet from the safe, where a quantity of the powder was found; some hasty words passed between Mr. Williams and Mr. Glover, but he should say much credit was due to Mr. Glover, for he inspired every one with confidence when he brought out the powder; shortly after the fire Mr. Quinlan told him that some of the Myles' people had been in his house, and that a cask and 3 iars of powder had been house, and that a cask and 3 jars of powder had been found in the cellar; on inspecting the premises he (Mr. Morris) conceived that the communication between the yards, and the exigency of the crisis obliged Mr. Myles' friends to convey the powder through a hole appeared of a door, from whence it was removed to the cellar underneath; he could scarcely stand in the room where the fire was, the apartment was so hot.

Mr. James Cavanagh having been aroused by the watchmen, took the precaution in the first instance, to knock up the gunpowder venders in the vicinity, four of whom are quite contiguous; he saw the fire in Mr. Myles' back parlour, and subsequently the powder which Mr. Glover brought out; he also saw the powder found at Mr. Quinlan's.

Mr. Vokes said he might here observe that, in consequence of the inconvenience complained of by the gunpowder venders of the City, for want of a depot, he had made every exertion to procure a safe and suitable place, but from the opposition of the people resident in every quarter he went to, he could not succeed. In order to obviate all difficulties, he decided on allotting a slated house of his own at Rhabane, for that purpose, and sent to all the venders to acquaint them that they should have the use of it, with a very coreful man, a pensioner at 1s. 8d. a-day, to take charge of it, the expense to each vender not to exceed £1 a-year. Since then he never heard from one of

them, nor wasa grain of powder lodged there.

Mr. Strong—Yes, Mr. Vokes, I assented to it.

Thomas Ryan, Mr. Vokes' gate-keeper, proved that he noticed all the venders about the opening of the powder depot at Rhabane; Mr. Strong was the first he went to, who told him he was very glad of it, desiring him to communicate it to the others, which he did.

Head Constable Daly stated that he last made search

Head Constable Daly stated, that he last made search at Mr. Myles's, about a fortnight ago, and examined every hole and corner, but did not find anything over the quantity allowed; he had to report Mr. Myles before, and was of opinion that the powder found on Thursday, was concealed when he last searched the premises. In answer to a question from the Bench, the Head Constable stated, that he did not search apartments occupied by lodgers, having received directions to that effect from the Magistrates.

Mr. James Myles was then called. He said, he should plead guilty to the charge of having the powder in his concern, not being aware of so much, adding that he had two orders in his possession to transmit 20lb. to Mr. O'Brien, of the slate quarry, Killaloe.

Mr. Spaight proposed the withdrawal of Mr. Myles' license, and suggested the propriety of writing to the Lord Lieutenant to ascertain if any other punishment

could be inflicted for infringing the law.

Mr. Roche read the draft of a memorial to the Lord Lieutenant on the subject, the adoption of which was seconded by Mr. Spaight, and unanimously agreed to.

The final order of the court was that the venders shall
