A Lieutenant of the 69th will shortly succeed to a company in a West India corps. A court-martial assembled at Chatham, for the trial of Serjeant Major Neelance, 12th Lancers. Mr. Brereton, S.M. has been removed from Borriskane to Portumna. Sir James Dombain, of the coast guard service, Colonel Brereton, of the revenue police, Mr. Rice, of the customs, and Captain Percy, of the excise, have been occupied at Letterkenny since Wednesday last, holding an investigation relative to charges preferred by the revenue police against the coast guards of the district, for having refused to co-operate with them in the discharge of their duty. Mr. Barron, R.M., with the assistance of the 69th and police, is enforcing the collection of poor-rate in the Ballinrobe union. The town was thronged with constabulary ordered from the different out-stations. Mr. Thomas O'Brien, Stipendiary Magistrate, has also a brother in the police establishment, with the rank of Sub-Inspector. LIMERICK PROTESTANT ORPHAN SOCIETY.—At the monthly meeting of the committee of this valuable society held on Tuesday last, five additional orphans were admitted, being all the eligible cases submitted to their consideration. Three of the successful candidates were from the city and two from the county. Of the former one was a boy, ten years old, and a little girl only 2 years old, the destitute orphans of a working jeweller, who were in the most abject state of distress when discovered by the benevolent individuals who brought their case before the committee. From the county were two memorial presented in behalf of a little boy, aged 5 years, whose father had been a parish clerk, and of a little girl only 3 years old, the daughter of a toll-collector. On the same occasion two of the orphans were elected to the choir of the Cathedral, another was apprenticed to a lady who has ever taken a warm interest in the society, and a third was granted to a very respectable tradesman, who usually receives a large fee, but preferred assisting this Society by taking one of the grown children. Thus extensively beneficial are the operations of this excellent charity, continually communicating and receiving the best favours. The noble, generous, and unequivocal manner in which the Society at the last public meeting affixed the broad seal of public approval on the enlarged views of privilege and duty which hitherto distinguished this society, and secured it the blessing of Divine Providence, has greatly encouraged the committee to keep this door of mercy ever open to the destitute orphan and bereaved widow of the household of faith. The public meetings of the branch associations were fixed for the ensuing month. The annual sermon in behalf of the Irish Society of London was preached on Wednesday last by the Rev. E. G. Carr, late of this City. The Rev. P. M. Cumming, Rector and Vicar of Dromod, Kerry, value £200 a-year, proposes to surrender the income of the benefice to his creditors. The debts returned on his schedule to the Insolvent Court amount to £5,680, and the cause is set down for hearing in Dublin on the 17th inst. The petitioner's son is an officer in the 9th Regt. On Monday, the foundation stone of a new Wesleyan chapel was laid about two miles from Belfast, on the Falls Road. The site was granted at a nominal rent by John Alexander, Esq. of Carlaw and Belfast Mills. The Rev. Godfrey Massy gratefully acknowledges the receipt of £1 for Adelaide School, collected by the Rev. George M. Massy. The Rev. George Maxwell thankfully acknowledges to have received the following sums in aid of the funds of the Limerick Diocesan Irish Society, viz:—From the Rev. G. Brown, Esq. 10s., and £5 6s. 2d. from Rev. Godfrey Massy amount of the collection made in Bruff Church for the Society, on 17th March last. The Rev. Solomon Frost, who read his abjuration, and conformed to the Established Church in Dublin, on Sunday, studied at Maynooth, and was ordained from the diocese of Limerick, where he served as curate of Dromocolloher and St. Patrick's. He subsequently embarked in the "Robert Kerr," from this port, in January, 1841, with emigrants for Jamaica, whence he proceeded to the United States, and returned within the last year to his native country. The Apostle of Temperance has returned to Cork, from Castlecomer, where he preached and administered the Total Abstinence pledge to 12,000 persons. Amongst the numbers was the lady of Col. We understand that the annual charity sermon in aid of the Male and Female Poor Schools of St. Munchin's parish, will be preached on Trinity Sunday, the 2d June. The Rev. Mr. Mullen, P.P., Hannastown, Belfast, dropped dead on the road to Ballymena on Wednesday. The Rev. John Murphy, ordained at Rome for the English mission, has left that city for the Lancashire district. The Association in Ireland for the propagation of the R.C. Faith, received from the 1st of April to the 6th of May, inst. £743, including from St. Michael's parish, Limerick, per the Rev. P. D'Arcy, £11. A branch of the Presentation Order is opened at Listowel, by the Right Rev. Dr. Egan, of Tralee, and where four nuns are now located in a new convent. Mrs. Pennefather and Mrs. Manning have bestowed on the Convent of Cashel the greater portion of the furniture of their house in Cashel, amounting to one hundred pounds. for an investigation. As he understood, the application was made not for the purpose of vindicating the persons charged, but in order to afford an opportunity of bringing charges against others, persons perhaps above himself in authority, or on a level with him. This being the case, he should state that he, as a magistrate, was not competent to deal with anything but the guilt or innocence of the accused, who are now in custody. He should, however, if any additional light could be thrown on the transaction, be most willing to receive it, and to forward every circumstance of importance to government. Mr. Gabbett—But this is a County case, and we cannot interfere at all, as City Magistrates. Mr. Vokes said he could pledge himself, as far as Looney was concerned, that there was not a particle of evidence to warrant the suspicion that this matter was concocted in the City. With respect to the others he could not give an opinion, for he was not officially informed of the matter until the day after. Some observations were made by the bench generally as to the propriety of having the investigation public, but Mr. Gooild did not think it prudent to assent, lest such a course would tend to injure the case against prisoners. He therefore advised Mr. Murphy to memorial the Government, if he considered an investigation necessary to enquire into the conduct of others; and might feel assured that as far as he was concerned, not being but an impartial statement would go forward, and to which Mr. Murphy, or those interested, could have access. Thus the matter ended. Charles C. Deacon, esq. Adjutant 61st Regt. summoned James Gleeson, a cab driver, for obtaining money under false pretences. It appeared from the officer's statement that on the night of the General's ball he engaged the defendant to convey a family home, and after having done so he was himself driven home to the barracks, where he enquired the charge for the entire, which he was told was 3s. He gave the driver the amount, with 6d. for himself, on the understanding that he was not to make any demand on the family he had previously set down in George's-street; yet the next day he went to their residence and obtained 2s. Informations were ordered against Gleeson, but the Adjutant fearing that his Regiment may leave before the Quarter Sessions come on, said he merely wished to bring the matter before the public, for the good of the community. Gleeson subsequently made an apology to the Adjutant, and was dismissed, with a reprimand by the Court, having first paid the additional 2s. he had exacted. Mr. John Egan, of Robert-street, summoned Mr. Harrison Lee, for breach of contract. In this case Mr. Lee undertook to erect a kind of a saw mill, to be impelled by machinery, but his workmen refused to execute the work, lest it would prove injurious to the hand sawyers of the city. Mr. Egan explained that the species of work he wanted to have done, would be no injury whatever to the sawyers; he was at present obliged to get the article (brush stocks) from Dublin, at a considerable expense for carriage, while if he was allowed to proceed in the way he intended it would enable him to employ 50 men more than he had at present. He had no blame to Mr. Lee on this occasion, but he wished to elicit who it was obliged him to discontinue the work. Mr. Lee—All my men were afraid to have anything to do with it, and might be the means of turning all my men against me—besides injure my establishment. It might be like the Cork business in the end! As it did not appear that there was any specific agreement between the parties for the erection of the machine, the Magistrates could not interfere, but promised to assist Mr. Egan in every legal way. The following letter was received by the Mayor from the Under Secretary, and read:— Dublin Castle, 8th May, 1844. Sir—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 6th inst. enclosing a memorial from the Magistrates of the City of Limerick, as to the storage and sale of Gunpowder, and I am directed by the Lord Lieutenant to observe, that the recommendation of the person to be licensed for the sale of that article being altogether in the hands of the Magistracy, and as they also have power under 6th & 7th Vic. c. 74, sec. 38, to examine stores at all reasonable times with the aid of the Constabulary, his Excellency trusts that a due exercise of their power will sufficiently provide for the objects they have in view. I am further commanded to acquaint you that the license of Mr. Myles has been cancelled by the enclosed order. The gunpowder in his possession should be handed to the Constabulary, to be placed in the Ordnance magazine, until he can dispose of it with the Magistrates concurrence, to some other licensed dealer. I have the honor to be, Sir, your obedient servant, E. LUCAS. To the Mayor of Limerick. Mr. W. Roche said they had abundant evidence that their own authority was not sufficient to prevent vendors from having an over-stock of powder. He hoped no fatality would arise in consequence of the refusal of Government to comply with their request, but if it did, they would have the consolation to say that they had cleared their conscience. The public had a very providential escape on a late occasion, and he recommended the Mayor to call a meeting of the citizens to petition Parliament on the subject. Amount of rate uncollected £1,177. Richard Gregory, an epileptic patient, died this week in Tralee workhouse. An inquest was held by order of the Guardians when the following verdict was returned: That Richard Gregory came to his death at Tralee workhouse, of epilepsy; and we find that the said Gregory was grossly and improperly treated and neglected, and contrary to the express directions of the medical attendant, and such treatment was calculated to accelerate his death, and did so. The medical services of Mr. R. H. Swyny, Inspector of Repeal wardens, have been dispensed with at the Bruff dispensary. The extensive mills at Colloony, occupied by Richard Mangan, Esq. were destroyed by fire, on Saturday night last. The property was insured. The foundation stone of a new market, denominated the St. Mary's Market, was laid on Wednesday by the Mayor of Cork. The *Severn*, screw steamer, plying between Bristol and Newport, when preparing to start with passengers and goods from Newport, on Saturday, swung round against the buttress of the bridge, with a strong tide, when she struck, recoiled with violence, and struck again, after which she went down, but luckily the passengers and crew escaped by boats from the sinking vessel.
