TO THE EDITOR OF THE LIMERICK CHRONICLE.
SIR,
IT is unnecessary for me to make any comment on the nature and origin of the opposition which was given on last Saturday at the "Road Sessions" to the Presentment for the maintenance of "Deserted Children" in St. Michael's Parish, as you have already pictured it in its true colours; but as the language of some of the speakers on that occasion may lead to a misapprehension of the manner in which I discharged my duty towards these destitute outcasts, I beg permission, through the medium of your columns, to offer to the public a brief statement of the facts. In the year 1836 I was appointed (altogether without my knowledge, and much against my inclination) one of the Overseers of Foundlings; but the act of Vestry once made, I had no option, and therefore undertook the unpleasant, though necessary office. During the first year the money was raised by assessment on the houses, and paid to the nurses monthly, without the expenditure of a shilling in my establishment; but in the subsequent year it appeared that it should be levied by presentment at the assizes, at the rate of £5 for each child. From this time the other overseers ceased to act, and thus the whole burden and responsibility devolved on me. In consequence of this charge the nurses had to remain an entire year and a half without payment, hence I was continually harassed by applications for an advance of money or an equivalent, many of them thinking they would never get paid. They represented to me that as their families stood in need of certain articles of clothing, it would be the same to obtain these or cash, and therefore, I reluctantly agreed to furnish them, but only to a limited extent, and these applications I have frequently refused, as I can have verified by the evidence of disinterested persons, were it necessary. It may be thought by some that I committed an indiscretion in yielding to their solicitations, but further than this I am satisfied, that no man who is acquainted with the circumstances will accuse me, for as to the invidious and ungrounded charge of a nurse, "that I obliged her" to take goods in my establishment, and these goods being afterwards sold for a trifling sum, I trust that my character as a man of business in Limerick for many years is too well known to be injured by such an unfounded imputation. When at a more recent period impediments of various kinds were thrown in the way of this charity, the Rev. H. D. L. WILLIS consulted with me on the subject, and we agreed to raise the sum necessary for paying the nurses the amount then due. This we did by a bill drawn in his name and mine, and the money deducting the unavoidable interest was paid to him to the several claimants. St. Munchin's Schools.
A SERMON in aid of the Male and Female Poor Schools of ST. MUNCHIN'S Parish will be preached in St. MICHAEL'S Chapel on SUNDAY next, the 2nd of June, at half-past two o'clock by the Rev. Walsh, P.P. of St. Munchin's, takes leave to state that in both these Schools nearly 400 destitute children are gratuitously educated; that until last year he had to supply the expenses of the Female School only, but since then he has become responsible for the entire expenses of both, without any other means than those derived from the contributions of the benevolent; he therefore looks forward with anxious hope to the fruits of the appeal to be made by the talented Preacher on next SUNDAY, as a necessary means for continuing the blessings of Education to the poor children of his parish.
