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The Archbishop officiated at the same charge as at Limerick. On the memorial of one of his parishioners, he gave orders that a curate should be appointed, at a salary of £75 a-year, to the parish of Kilmolloy, in which there are seventy or eighty Protestant residents. There was no Diocesan visitation, and the clergymen separated without dining together as customary. The Board of Trinity College have presented the Rev. William Atkins, A.M., F.T.C.D., to the valuable rectory of Ramelton, county of Donegal, vacant by the death of the Rev. Charles Boyton, D.D. On Thursday, the Rev. James Hamilton, was inducted into the Prebendaryship of Balla, Mayo, by the Rev. Henry Pasley, Rector of Ballyhean. The Lord Bishop of Worcester held a general ordination in the Cathedral of his diocese on Sunday last, when the following were admitted into Holy Orders:—Priests—Rev. Chaslet D. Bell, B.A., Rev. James Valentine, B.A., and Rev. George T. Payne, B.A., Trinity College, Dublin, by letters dimissory from the Archbishop of Dublin. Judge Jackson has sent £20 to the Clergy Sons' School, Lucan; Bishop of Kilmore, £30; Lords Langford and De Vesli, £10 each, and the Rev. C. Leslie, £10. The only contributions from this diocese are the Rev. R. Dickson, £3; Rev. J. Day, £1; and Rev. R. Hewson, 10s. The Right Rev. Dr. Murphy laid the foundation stone of a convent for the Sisters of Mercy at Cork, on Tuesday, adjoining the Magdalen asylum. The estimate is £2000, of which £1500 is collected. The Rt. Rev. Dr. McGettigan, R.C. Bishop of Derry, is a conservative, and a "personal and confidential friend" of Louis Philippe, King of the French. The Right Rev. Dr. Borghi of Thibet has sailed from Cork for the Indian mission, with Miss Smith, of the Grand Parade, and Miss M'Carthy, of Nile-street. Many ladies from Thurles and Dublin also accompany Dr. Borghi. Rev. Mr. O'Riordan, of the South Friary, is as far as London with the noviciates, who are all to take the white veil in Paris. At the late meeting of the Board of Trustees of the College of Maynooth, the Rt. Rev. Dr. J. Brown, Bishop of Kilmore, was appointed a Trustee to said College, in the room of the Rt. Rev. Dr. Kernan, of Clogher, deceased. Mr. Hamilton, M. P. Mr. Redington, M. P. and Mr. Wynn, M. P. members of the Land Commission, were auditors of the proceedings of the meeting at Galway, to address and subscribe for a testimonial to the Rt. Rev. Dr. Brown, R. C. B., on his removal to Elphin. The Sisters of Mercy bazaar, Galway, for the sick poor, realised £76. The Association in Ireland for the propagation of the Roman Catholic faith received from the 1st of July to the 5th of August inst. £700, including the bequest of the late Rev. Maurice Kearney, P.P. Clane, exclusive of £30 legacy duty, £270. The Mayor of Cork presided at a Repeal meeting in the City on Wednesday, to raise a fund for the erection of a Concession Hall. Mr. Dan Callaghan, M.P., did not attend. The first resolution was proposed by Capt. Broderick, late 34th Regt. The subscriptions acknowledged at the meeting did not exceed £30. The Grand Jury of Mayo have memorialled Lord Lansdale, Post-master General, to transmit the Dublin Mail to Tuam, Hollymount, Castlebar, and Westport, by the new line now opened by the Board of Works, from Athlone to Tuam, by Ballyforan and Mount Bellew, which shortens the distance 12 miles. Sir Edward Blakeney in the afternoon of yesterday went on board the "Flamer" steamer, Commander Postle, at the Pool, and was received with the usual honours by the officers and men, who fired a salute of 21 rounds for the distinguished veteran. There are at anchor here now, one Spanish frigate, with a Commodore's pendant; 1 Spanish corvette, 1 brig, 1 Sardinian corvette, 1 French brig, 1 Swedish corvette, a steamer, and 2 Danish frigates, in the offing, going to Gibraltar with us. The Consul-General, Mr. D. Hay, is at Mogadore, settling the Frenchmen's dispute with the Emperor of Morocco. Admiral Owen is expected at Gibraltar daily."

"Albion, Gibraltar, 20th July. "We came here the day before yesterday.
