Letters were read from Sir Robert Peel, Sir James Graham, and James Pennethorne, Esq., acknowledging the receipt of the resolution passed by the board in reference to Mr. Pennethorne's report.

The Finance Committee recommended the adoption of a plan furnished by W. H. Owen, Esq., for the erection of a fever hospital, in preference to that made by Mr. Wilkinson, the Commissioners' architect. According to the plan of the latter, the building was to be only two story high, capable of accommodating 48 persons, and the cost £600. Mr. Owen's plan is for a building three story high, to accommodate 102 patients, while the expense will not exceed £660.—Approved of.

After declaring Mr. O'Shaughnessy, George's-street. Medical hall, contractor for the supply of medicine to the Workhouse, the Board adjourned.

Mr. John MacNamara, brother of the member for Clare, has resigned his seat at the Ennistimon Board of Guardians, as the Commissioners sanctioned the return of a guardian named Fitzgibbon, who is said to be unqualified.

Monday a boy named Mahony, servant to a farmer named Corbett, near Newcastle, fell from the top of a load which he had on his car, and expired.

A meeting of the Grand Lodge of Londonderry county was held on Monday, at Garvah, in Lodge-room, 359, James W. Gregg, Esq. D.G.M. in the chair, for the purpose of electing a County Master, in the room of the late much lamented Rev. John Graham, when Geo. K. Babington, Esq. R.E.I.C.S. Portstewart, was unanimously elected to that important office, which was for many years most ably filled by Mr. Graham.

A numerous meeting took place at Camolin, Wexford, the Earl of Courtown in the chair, when an address was agreed to for presentation to George Glasscott, Esq. on being reinstated in the agency of the Mount-norris estate.

Mr. Maxwell, of Finnebrogue, refused £1,000 for his horse, Johnny, winner of the Ulster Leger, at the Down Royal Corporation Races. He is only three years old—the produce of Turcoman, out of Sylph, by Filho-da-Puta, out of Twatty, by Whalebone.

A declaration of attachment to the Church of England, and of disavowal of Tractarianism, has been signed by 2,328 clergymen of the establishment. The whole number of clergy in England and Wales is about 15,000.

The Lord Chancellor of England has presented the Rev. William Y. Smithies, to the Rectory of Shilbottle, Northumberland, value £222 per annum.

The Rev. Robert Hume, Rector of Urney, and his family, have returned to Urney house, after an absence of some months, occasioned by the demise of his respected relative, the late Arthur Hume, Esq. ex-Teller of the Irish Exchequer.
