

Monday last Capt. Eliot, 4th Dragoon Guards, and his servant boy, a lad about 15 years, left Athlone in a small sail boat for the purpose of duck shooting; they went down the river towards Shannon bridge. On their return home they were unfortunately drowned—no one can tell how. When Major Hodge found that he was not returning, he sent a boat after him; the messenger found two hats on the water not far from where their bodies were found next day, as also the boat, with four feet of the topmast above water. There is little doubt but the fatal event was purely accidental. Their remains were brought into Athlone barracks to await the coroner's inquest. Capt. Eliot's troop was under orders for this garrison, next week.

The Depot of the 33d at Buttevant, is held in readiness to move to Fermoy.

Head quarters of the 66th, under Lieut.-Colonel Johnson from Belfast, landed on Thursday in Dublin, and marched to the Royal barracks.

Head quarters of the 5th Fusiliers embarked yesterday at the North wall, Dublin, for Belfast, by the Alban steamer.

The "Lord Hardwicke," "Samuel Boddington," and "Eden," transports, have arrived at Cork, to embark the 61st for Calcutta; head-quarters in the first named vessel.

The "Palmyra" transport has arrived at Cove, to embark a division of the 60th, this day, for Calcutta.

The garrison of Gibraltar is to be reinforced by another Regiment, and another company of Artillery. The 72d, at Buttevant, are hourly expecting the order to march to Cork, and embark thence for the Rock.

Extract of a letter from Portsmouth at the LIMERICK CHRONICLE OFFICE, yesterday:—"The Prince of Prussia and the Duke of Wellington came down by railway. They went out to Spithead to visit the Collingwood 80, and lunched on board. The Prussian can have seen but few ships of the line; however had he seen all the navies in the world, he could not have selected from among them a more perfect man-of-war than the future flag-ship in the Pacific. She was built by Sir William Symonds, and is an improvement upon his Vanguard. Six sail of the line, in addition to our present naval force, are to be commissioned immediately, and got ready for sea with all possible dispatch. The facts that there was no British ship or steamer at Tangiers when the bombardment took place, and that the British Consul had to take refuge on board the French flag-ship, and so witness that untoward event, are to be lamented. It appears that the old English Admiral was outwitted by the young Frenchman. That noble ship, the Queen, the finest three-decker in the British navy, will be ready for sea in a few weeks.

Extract of a letter received this day.—"The first French account at Tangiers was incorrect. The British Consul embarked at Mogadore, and on board the Vesuvius, and there was a British man of war at Tangier during the bombardment. [We, L. C. stated in our last that the Albion and Warspite were lying at Tangiers.] A Lieutenant of the Marine Artillery, and ten men additional, embarked to day on board the Collingwood, 80, at Spithead. It is expected that she will sail immediately for Gibraltar."

A general court-martial assembled at the Royal Barracks, Dublin, on Thursday, for the trial of prisoners, Lieut.-Col. Campbell, 16th Regt. President—14 members, officers of the garrison, 4 of whom to be Subalterns. David Walker, Esq. Deputy Judge Advocate.

Lieut. Macbean, St. Helena Regt. nephew of Lieut.-Gen. Sir W. Macbean, late commanding this district, has arrived from St. Helena, upon 18 months' leave, and is now residing with his father at Woolwich.

The 48th Regiment, within the last four months, in the West Indies, only lost four men, two of whom died of accidents.

Captain Hamilton, 48th, leaves London in the Boadicea for the West Indies.

Captain G. P. Hardy and Lieut. Balneavis, of the 58th Regt. with two sergeants, two corporals, and 48 privates, marched on Thursday from Chatham, for Deptford, there to embark on board the transport ship Robert Peel, for Sydney.

A guard of honor of the 47th, under command of Capt. Lardner, with the band and colours of the Regt. received Prince William of Prussia and the Duke of Wellington, at Gosport, on Monday. The Prince visited Nelson's ship, the Victory, at Portsmouth, and observed the well-known spot on the quarter-deck where that gallant hero fell. The Prince, observing the motto of "England expects that every man this day will do his duty," observed to those around him, "So long as that sentence is remembered by British seamen, so long I am convinced will England maintain her well-earned sovereignty of the sea."

Lieut. the Hon. F. Fane, 53d, embarking for India, has exchanged into the 74th Regiment.

Lieut. Sir J. Drummond, Grenadier Guards, Major Wilford, 60th, and Lieut. Horner, 68th, sold out of the service this week.

The officers of the 19th Depot performed the "Rivals" and "Bombastes Furioso," at Jersey theatre, on Thursday.

A troop of the 13th Light Dragoons, at Caermarthen, have converted part of their stabling into a theatre.

The Sergeant-Major of the 15th Hussars is promoted to a Cornetcy in his Regt.

Capt. the Hon. St. George Foley, of the 53d, embarking for India, has exchanged into the 44th. This officer is on the staff of the Commander of the Forces in Ireland.

Sergeant-Major Shean, 51st, is promoted to be Quartermaster of the Regt.

Private George Middle ditch, Coldstream Guards, was sentenced by the Recorder of London, on Tuesday, to be transported for life, for having falsely accused Major General Thackeray, of an abominable offence, with the intention of extorting money.

Lieutenant Harvey Tuckett, late 11th Hussars, is announced to appear at the Brighton theatre in the character of Sir John Falstaff, which he enacted in this city a few weeks ago.

Dr. Miller is appointed Surgeon Superintendent of the Hon. East India Company's ship Scotia, at Gravesend, to sail with troops for Calcutta and Madras on the 31st inst.

The Stromboli steam-sloop, Commander Hon. E. Plunket, has been taken into dock at Devonport, and her defects examined. It has been ascertained that she had lost a few sheets of copper only, and ten feet of her false keel had been rubbed on the larboard side, by the accident at Bantry bay. Her engines are in good order.

Captain Warner has announced to the Government that if they will anchor a line-of-battle ship at the back of the Godwin Sand, he will from on board of another ship destroy her at a distance of five miles by means of a projectile! He requires a guarantee of £300,000 in case he succeeds.

Mr. Joseph Mundy, boatswain of the Vindictive, is dismissed the service by Court-martial at Portsmouth, for habitual drunkenness.

A young man, of the name of Pigott was killed in a faction fight at Kilworth, county Cork, on Ascension Thursday.

The Lord Bishop of Kilmore, has appointed the Rev. Andrew Hogg, Curate of Cloon, to the living of Ballymahon. vacant by the death of the Rev. Francis M'Guire.

The annual meeting of the Church Missionary Society was held in Gorey, on Wednesday last, the Lord Bishop of Ossory in the chair. Lord Courtown and a number of the clergy and gentry were present.

At the Liverpool Assizes, Rev. Mr. Aldis, formerly an artist, but now a clergyman, obtained a verdict against an attorney of the name of Gardiner for professional negligence. Damages £300.

Sir Cecil A. Bishopp, Bart., was last month admitted to deacon's orders, by the Bishop of Gibraltar, at Malta.

Rev. H. J. Stevenson, examining chaplain to the Lord Bishop of Worcester, has declined the acceptance of the valuable rectory of St. Philip's, Birmingham, in consequence of his health being unequal to the discharge of its laborious duties.

In Dingle Church last Sunday, five Roman Catholics publicly declared their conversion to the Church of England.

The Magistrates of Dingle were called on last week to investigate a charge against the Rev. Mr. Brasbie, late a Priest—now a member of the Church of England—for firing at a man; the sole occasion or ground for the charge being, that the desperate conduct and attempts to make away with Mr. Brasbie, compel him to carry fire arms to preserve his liberty, if not his life. The charge itself for snapping a pistol at Patrick Quill, was disproved by several witnesses, and the complaint was then dismissed by the Magistrates.

The Rev. Godfrey Massy gratefully acknowledges the receipt of £5 5s. from Lord Gort for the Protestant Orphan Society.

The Rt. Rev. Dr. Denvir has returned to Belfast from Paris, with altar decorations for the new chapel.

Rev. Mr. Dunne, of Dundalk, O. S. D. is elected Provincial of the Augustinian Order of Friars in Ireland, vice Harold.

The suspension of the Rev. Mr. Keenan, P. P. of Anaghlong, diocese of Dromore, by his Bishop, Dr. Blake, is likely to lead to ulterior consequences of a singular and important character. It appears that on an appeal being made, and a representation of the facts submitted to Dr. Crolly, Roman Catholic Primate, an order was issued by him for Dr. Keenan's restoration to his former clerical status, but that Doctor Blake declared he would rather withdraw to a convent than obey the order! The matter, then, stands in this extraordinary position. Doctor Keenan was tried and convicted without, as he alleges, any opportunity or defence being afforded him. He appeals to his Metropolitan, who orders a reversal of the sentence, but Dr. Blake refuses to carry this order into effect. The Bishop is a fierce Repealer. The Priest is no agitator, and always avoided, as unclerical, the angry whirlpool of political strife.

The Hon. and Rev. Walter Clifford, a Jesuit on the Madras mission, and brother of Lord Clifford, was drowned at Trichinopoly last June.

The new Roman Catholic Chapel at Newcastle-upon-Tyne, was opened on Wednesday last for Divine worship. Amongst the Prelates who officiate are the Rev. Dr. Baggis, late principal of the English College at Rome; Rev. Dr. Riddell, Bishop of Longo; Rev. Dr. Gillis, Bishop of Lymyra, and Rev. Dr. Morris, Bishop of Troy A Pontifical High Mass was celebrated by Dr. Riddell. The Sisters of Mercy gratefully acknowledge the receipt £1 from the Rt. Hon. D. R. Pigot, Q. C.

There are forty-six parishes in the county Galway, which this year declined making any remittance to the Repeal fund. There are fifteen parishes in the county Leitrim which have also declined contributing.

Lord Charleville's fee simple estate in this county, 4000 acres, is again offered for sale.

Pigs were the only description of animals that sold well, and brought high prices at Spencilhill fair.

Every debtor in the Liverpool goal was released on Saturday last, under the operation of the new Act for the abolition of imprisonment for debt.

At the Fair of Newcastle, there were many buyers in attendance. Milch Cows rated from £8 10s. to £10; Fat Cows rather scarce, from £8 to £11; two year-old Heifers £5 5s. to £7; Calves £4 to £5; Store Sheep 18s. to 26s. each; fat Sheep 30s. to 36s.; Lambs 14s. to 16s.; Bacon Pigs 33s. to 35s. per cwt.; Store Pigs 18s to 34s. each.

At the Newcastle Butter Market on Thursday, the Limerick buyers purchased 63 firkins of butter; the highest price was 41s. 6d. a firkin.
