The whole concluded with nine hearty cheers for the Earl of Devon, the Chairman, and Colonel Robinson, the managing director of the waste land society.

longitude are proceeding with great success at Valencia, county Kerry. The important result will be the exact measurement of a vast area of the globe from Kamscathka to the western extremity of Ireland, at Valencia. The actual observations at Valencia are now conducted by Lieut. Gossett, R.E.
