Mr. Gulston, one of the Poor Law Commissioners, and their architect, Mr. Wilkinson, unexpectedly visited the Kilmallock Union Workhouse, on Tuesday 20th inst., and were pleased with the regularity in which they found it. They expressed the utmost satisfaction at the comfort, order, and management of the hospital.

Mr. Commissioner Gulston has returned to Dublin from visiting several workhouses in the South of Ireland. Charles Mathew, Esq. Poor Law Auditor, will attend at the Tralee Workhouse, on Thursday, to audit the accounts of the Union.

John and William Dushe, John Sexton, Patk. Connor, and John Dawlin, juvenile paupers, from this city, were refused admission to the Cork workhouse on Monday, by the guardians. Mr. Assistant Commissioner Burke recognised one of them as having been turned out of the Limerick workhouse for improper conduct.

The Provincial Bank, at its several branches, has reduced the rates of discount on Irish bills to four per cent. and on English and Scotch to 3 1/2.

The Secretaryship of the Great North of England Railway Company is vacant by the resignation of Wm. O'Brien, Esq., that gentleman having been appointed Private Secretary to Sir James Graham, in the room of his brother, D. O'Brien, Esq., who has received the appointment of Principal Registrar under the Joint-stock Companies' Act.

We are authorised to state that the Directors of the Dublin and Cashel Railway have put forward the present Prospectus with a view to extend their line to the cities of Cork and Limerick. The whole is to form one company, the profits to be equally divided between the original shareholders and those who may take shares in these extensions.—Cork Examiner.

The Yacht Club Regatta ball, at Cove, on Monday night, was the most brilliant known for many years in Cork. At supper, O'Grady proposed the health of Admiral Sir Hugh Pigot, commanding the naval force on the Irish coast, who returned thanks for the compliment.

Lieut. Calvert, Queen's Bays, Mr. E. B. Roche, M. P. Capt. Lloyd, Drew, & Misses Murray, Dickens, Hardy, Shanahan, and Brandon, danced in the Polka.

The observations connected with the fixing of the longitude are proceeding with great success at Valencia, county Kerry. Professor Airy, the astronomer royal of Greenwich, determined last year on selecting a point on the highest land in Valencia for determining the west longitude from London.

Lieut. Hornby, R.E. was appointed to the preliminary duty of ascertaining the latitude of the chosen position, and of building a base for the astronomical instruments. Professor Airy proceeded to Valencia last month, and made all the necessary arrangements. Coincident with these proceedings, an operation has been going on to ascertain the longitude from the eastern extremity of the Russian empire to Greenwich. The Government of Germany have been engaged in corresponding operations. The important result will be the exact measurement of a vast area of the globe from Kamscathka to the western extremity of Ireland, at Valencia. The actual observations at Valencia are now conducted by Lieut. Gossett, R.E. He entertained a select party of the neighbouring gentry including the Knight of Kerry, at a banquet on the summit of the mountain, a height of nearly 900 feet above the level of the sea.

Mr. J. C. Shaw has resigned the situation of marine manager of the City of Dublin Steam-boat Company in Liverpool, which he has held for 20 years. He has entered upon the management of the Kennet and Avon Canal Navigation, between London and Bristol.
