SUDDEN DEATH OF CAPTAIN FISHER.—On Wednes-
day last Captain Fisher, many years Captain Superin-
tendent of the royal dock-yard, Sheerness, and who
had previously been in his accustomed good state of
health, was suddenly attacked by paralysis. Medical
aid was promptly in attendance, but notwithstanding
the best advice and assistance, the unfortunate gentle-
man expired in the afternoon. When Captain Fisher
was attacked, he was superintending the docking of one
of the advanced ships selected to be brought forward
for commission. Captain Fisher has left a numerous
family to bewail his premature death, which is regretted
by a wide circle of friends and acquaintances. He
was father-in-law to Lieut. Hamilton, 99th, aide-de-
camp to Major-General Lord Downes, commanding
the Limerick district.

Captain Manley Dixon (son of the late Admiral Sir
Manley Dixon) is appointed to the command of the

derson, at Portsmouth, will shortly be superseded from
the like services, his period having expired.
