

The Rev. William P. Hazlewood is appointed to the rectory of Ardingly, Sussex, value £498. The Rev. George Coke, to the rectory of Piddlehinton, Dorset, value £264.

Lord de Mauley has presented the Rev. E. P. Blount recently returned from the Cape of Good Hope, to the Rectory of St. Mary's, Longfleet, Poole.

On Thursday last Rev. Mr. Gayer's children, and two young ladies that are staying with his family, went to visit his scriptural school to the west of Dingle, and were sitting in a field when a ruffian of the name of Sullivan came up, beat the little children and tore their bonnets. Not content with this outrage, the cowardly scoundrel struck with his fist and kicked one of the young ladies, who is very much hurt. This assault was committed without any provocation, unless it be that the Rev. Mr. Gayer is celebrated for his zeal in the single mission, and has lent his countenance and protection to the Rev. Mr. Brasbie, late a priest of the church of Rome, but now a member of the Protestant church, and who is domiciled with Mr. Gayer.

A fund is opened in Dublin for the Priest's Asylum, Achill, and several subscriptions were received in the past week, by the Rev. T. Scott, and Rev. C. Minchin.

On Sunday morning, Mr. Scott, clerk of the church at Monsee, county Tipperary, was dreadfully beaten by three fellows, who left him for dead.

The annual panegyric on St. Augustine was pronounced on Sunday to a full congregation at the Augustine Chapel, George's-street, by the Rev. Mr. Carroll of the Franciscan Chapel.

After his sermon at Kildorrery on Sunday, Rev. Mr. Mathew spoke on the subject of total abstinence, and mentioned a fact which he witnessed that morning. A young man, the principal support of his mother, a widow, and her family, returning from Cork to Mallow with a load of slate, got drunk, fell off the car, and was found dead on the road by persons passing!

Lord Shrewsbury has contributed £10,000 to the new Roman Catholic Chapel of St. Barnabas, at Nottingham, which was consecrated last week, when 14 Bishops including Dr. Murphy, of Cork, Dr. Gillis, a Scotch prelate, and 100 Priests attended. The grand altar is of Petworth marble, from the seat of Col. Wyndham. The Rt. Rev. Dr. Wiseman preached upon the spread of the Roman Catholic faith in England, and exulted in the building of 54 chapels throughout England, or as he termed them churches, in the last six years; nineteen nunneries and eight convents of the Christian Brothers. St. Barnabas, Nottingham, is the largest Chapel erected since the Reformation, and St. George's, London, now in progress, will be second only to St. Paul's.

Rt. Rev. Dr. Kennedy, on Saturday, will lay the foundation stone of a new chapel at Roscrea, of which he had been Parish Priest.

Mr. O'Connell has announced that the first public demonstration he will preside at, on his discharge from prison, is to be one for aiding the erection of the Chappelized new chapel.

The Pope has refused to confirm the Roman Catholic Bishop of Masovia in Poland, who was nominated by the Emperor Nicholas and approved by the Chapter.

Rt. Rev. Dr. Hughes, R. C. Bishop of Gibraltar has arrived at Rome.

The Tralee and Blenerville navigable canal, limited to two miles, has been 12 years in construction, and is yet unfinished. The Board of works have given orders to complete the work, if possible, this year.

A new iron steamer, Princess Alice, was this week placed on the Derry and London line, making the passage in 23 hours.

The want of a bridewell at Mountmelick is much complained of.

Town Council.—An open Committee meeting of this body was held yesterday, the Mayor in the chair, "to consider the provisions of the bill introduced by Mr. S. O'Brien, for the establishment and regulation of markets for the sale of corn and provisions" in Ireland.—The Press was not admitted.

Mr. O'Connell is not a teetotaler, as commonly believed by those of his own religious and political persuasion. His favourite beverage is champagne.

The Active of Liverpool, for London, was the first vessel from the Shannon this season with new oats for the English market, and the Ellen, for Liverpool, the first that sailed hence with new wheat.

The intercourse between Dublin and Limerick, by canal navigation, is increasing fast. The Burgoyne steamer has commenced from Killaloe, up; and the Gazelle fly boat, between Portumna and Shannon harbour, affords every possible accommodation, the best refreshment to passengers, at the most moderate charges, of every attention that can be desired.

The situation which Mr. Shaw held as marine manager to the Dublin Steam-boat Company, in Liverpool, has been divided into three branches, the marine under Captain Sarsfield, R.N., late commander of one of the Dublin mail-packet boats; the engineering under Mr. John Grantham, civil engineer, and author of "Iron as a material for shipbuilding;" and the office has been confided to Mr. O'Donoghue.

On Monday, Peter Rourke, of Cloon, County Leitrim, put a period to his existence in the goal of Carrick-on-Shannon, where he had been confined as a lunatic. The deceased only just escaped from his keepers, when he flung himself off a form upon his head, with such violence as to produce almost instant death.

The Magistrates of the County of Waterford are about to memorial the Lord Lieutenant to appoint a Surveyor who would reside at Dungarvan in the centre of the county, and praying that the duties of the present surveyor should be confined solely to the City of Waterford, where he holds his residence. This arrangement will create a vacancy for a new County Surveyor.

The Marquis Sligo and Earl Charleville's extensive stock of cows and sheep are offered by auction.

Matthew Clune, of Ballymaclone, county Clare, was recently gored to death by a bull in the neighbourhood. The large grain and provision stores at Ballina, Mayo, are to be sold at the suit of the Provincial bank.

New wheat in Tralee market sells at 13½d. per stone. Madame Vestris and her husband, Mr. Charles Mathews, have concluded a prosperous engagement at Plymouth theatre.

The bodies of five fishermen, whose death by drowning at the Point, Sligo, we mentioned, have been got by their friends, being washed in by the tide. It is surprising that the body of Mr. Cuffe Martin has not been got, and it tends to increase the suspicion that he was plundered and buried in the sand.

The Liverpool stamp office has extended its hours of public business from 4 to 7 in the evening.

At Sydney, New South Wales, arrangements were making for salting beef on a large scale for the English market.

Mr. Hughes' troop of equestrians performed at Maryborough this day. They appear at Mountrath tomorrow, Roscrea, on Friday and Saturday; thence to Nenagh, Borrisokane, Birr.

Mr. Thomas Bond is appointed Courthouse-keeper at Cashel.

Mr. Wm. Burroughs opens the Waterford theatre, on Monday.

A most interesting letter from a highly respectable resident professional gentleman, upon a recent catastrophe in an adjoining County, shall appear on Saturday.

The winning horses at i uam races were Mr. Kinkney's Miss Mathew, of the silver challenge cup given by Mr. Bodkin, M. P.; Mr. Irwin's Longford, a sweepstakes; Mr. Blake's Belle Poule, the hunters' plate; Mr. Irwin's Honest Ned, the handicap; Mr. French's Clansman, sweepstakes, and Mr. Kelly's Bacchus, handicap and sweepstakes. A girl was rode over in the course, and killed.

There was a horse race for a new saddle at Spencil-hill, near Ennis, on Sunday, when one of the riders was thrown and nearly killed. What other luck could attend such Sabbath violation!

There are to be races at the Spa, Tralee, on the 11th inst.

The statue of the late Mr. Huskisson, presented by his widow to the town of Liverpool, is to be erected in the custom-house of that port.

The Magistrates at Tullamore petty sessions have desired their clerk to disregard the instructions of the Chief Remembrancer, who directed that summonses for nuisances should be granted gratis.

The guardians of Abbeyleix union are about to discharge their master, who prefers attending to the instructions of the commissioners before the guardians.

Last week the servant boy of the Rev. Mr. Cummins P.P. of Ballyshannon, absconded with a large sum of money, the property of his master.

On Monday, a man was arrested by the Constabulary in Bundoran, Ballyshannon, for selling tea, which was ascertained to be only shoe-leaves, dried and blackened with logwood.

The corn stores of Alderman Sherlock, at Sligo, were burned down on Tuesday night. The concerns and property were insured, but will not cover the loss.

There was a public meeting at Galway on Monday, to promote the coast fishery.

The mail-coaches from Dublin to Belfast, Derry, and Enniskillen, will be discontinued on the 25th instant, when the mails will be conveyed by rail to Drogheda, from whence they will be dispatched by coaches to their several destinations.

The present volume of the *Dublin Medical Press* contains an elaborate series of papers on Renal Physiology, by Dr. Kidd, (Doonass) in which this very obscure but interesting subject is treated of with great ability and research.

A tug steamer is now navigating the river Moy, in Mayo, probably the first steamer which has yet proceeded in land the Connaught province.

Mary Heuston, alias Magrath, supposed to be from this neighbourhood, is apprehended in Fennis for shop-lifting.

The Americans are organising a fleet of steamers to sail weekly between New York and Liverpool. They are to be all Yankees.

"Venice Preserved; or the Plot discovered," was brought out on Monday evening to a full house, attracted, doubtless, by its portentous name, and the excellence of the principal performers. In fact, the author's fitful career, like the plot he portrayed, was a continuous chapter of misery, with transient gleams of sunshine, but descending fast in his own person to that fatal exit which he records. The mind of the poet, to whom the drama owes this extraordinary effort of the tragic muse, which in gloomy horror, fearful incident, depth of passion, and more appalling consummation, has not a rival on the English stage, was fully imbued with those dismal images to which he has given such bold and vivid form. The three principal characters are drawn in colours of light and shade so distinctly marked; bold imperious, and vindictive, occasionally blended with the amiable, tender, and endearing, become all more intense and powerful, as the tragic plot advances to its final catastrophe. The strongest feelings of the audience are evoked, and the curtain at last falls upon a grand climacteric, fearful to reflect upon in the closet, but more painful still to behold upon the stage. Miss Faucit, Mr. Paumier, and Mr. Seymour, each received the ardent tribute of applause, which their admirable representation of parts so highly wrought, won from a most intelligent and deeply attentive house. The enthusiastic gratification was only repressed by fear that a single breath of applause might in some scenes deprive the audience of even a syllable of the dialogue, a look, or a gesture, so irresistibly were the senses borne along by the many beautiful points elicited in the performance. Miss Faucit, it may be supposed, was transcendent in "Belvidera." "Romeo and Juliet" is announced for this evening. "The Stranger" for to-morrow.
