was the last Sovereign seen at Dundee, where her Majesty was expected to land on Wednesday last.

Major-General Sir Neil Douglas, commander of the Forces in Scotland, left Edinburgh to receive her Majesty at Dundee, with military honors, by a division of the 60th Rifles, from Stirling.

Mr. Townley Parker, a Conservative Roman Catholic, of great influence in North Lancashire, was invited to stand for the vacant seat, on Lord Stanley's retirement but has declined in favor of Mr. Clifton, a connexion of the Lowther family, who had been a member of the Church of Rome, but abjured some years ago.

Wednesday last an inquest was held at Shannaclough, near Crecora, by James Bennett, Esq. coroner, on the body of James Dea, who was burned to death. It appeared from the evidence that the previous night as Constable Slattery was patrolling with his party in the vicinity he observed a fire in the bog, and hastening to the spot discovered a hut in flames. He instantly alarmed the neighbourhood, and every exertion was made to save the above unhappy creature, who was enveloped in flames, but in vain. Clement Peat, Esq. M. D. deposed to the frightful nature of the injuries sustained, and the jury returned a verdict accordingly. The deceased was a young man of weak intellect, who preferred spending his nights in this solitary hut to sleeping in the farmers houses, which he usually frequented.
