Ship-Wrights' Committee Room, No. 10, ARTHUR'S-QUAY, Limerick, September 30th 1844.
FELLOW CITIZENS—We the undersigned members, the Committee of the guild of Shipwrights of the city of Limerick, feel it imperative on us, for many reasons, to repudiate, in the strongest terms, one of the gross-est calumnies that rumour, ever active in making falshood ripe, attempted to circulate. Ere this, it is to be dreaded many have heard the treacherous, base and cruel practice recently perpetrated in our port—that of perforating the bottoms of vessels, with what view we shall not attempt to say, but we regret that the foul deed has been attributed to our guild, forsooth, because it would be a source of employment to them. We should not have noticed more than any other members of society, what vulgar rumour said of this matter, had it not been commented on (in kindly feeling, and with a view to admonish, rather than criminate any portion of his fellow-citizens) by a highly respected functionary of our city, J. W. Geary, Esq. Mayor. Therefore it is, that we all, in common sense, in attestation of our innocence of the deed, and in baring a hole in the bottom of a vessel of iron and quarter or inch and half diameter, could be no source of employment to us as a plug or trunnell would secure the breach at an expense of about six pence—and base again do we pronounce the man who would, perhaps, sacrifice the lives of an entire crew, for such paltry employment. We are at a loss then, to know how it would prove a source of employment to Shipwrights—had she proceeded to sea before her leakage became known, would she not put into the next port—ten to one that may not be Limerick, and then this great six-penny job fell into the hands of strangers.—That the deed had been perpetrated we will not deny, but from what motive, or for what end we will leave Mr. Rumour to discover, and that he may the more energetically employ his talents to find it out, we hereby offer a Reward of £5, to any one who, within the period of six calendar months, shall give such information as may lead to conviction of the person or persons guilty of the aforesaid act.
