

...this board, called to take into consideration the resolution of the Limerick Board of Guardians relative to the power of the Poor Law Commissioners, under the 41st Article of their late General Orders, respecting the Clerk of Unions in Ireland—Resolved—That we fully approve of the Resolutions of the Limerick Board of Guardians, and that we will co-operate with them to have the said Article of the Poor Law Commissioners respecting the Clerks, rescinded.

At a meeting of the Cork Guardians it was resolved to strike a rate of 5d. in the pound upon the city, and 24d. in the pound on the rural division.

Sir E. Borough having resigned the office of Vice-chairman of their board, the South Dublin guardians divided 17 to 17 upon a successor, the candidates being Henry Bowles, Esq. late of this city, and John Reynolds, Esq. In this dilemma, a new candidate, Lt.-Col. Shaw was proposed, and elected without further division.

William Sandes, jun. Esq. of Pyrmont, one of the ex-officio guardians for Listowel, has presided over the board of that union since its formation.

PROTESTANT ORPHAN BAZAAR—This day, the Ladies' Bazaar, in aid of the funds of the Limerick Protestant Orphan Society, was opened in the large room of the Philosophical Society House, and never was seen in that splendid apartment so great an influx of the nobility and gentry of this and the adjoining counties.

The room was decorated for the occasion, by Mr. Purser, with characteristic taste and elegance. The different stalls were supplied with every article which art and fashion could devise, to captivate the attention of the visitors who came to cheer the Orphan's friend.

The splendid band of the 15th Regt. attended, and performed some delicious pieces of music. The Lord Bishop of Killaloe, the Earl of Clare, Major-Gen. Lord Downes, Lord Capra, Col. Cator, R.H.A. Sir Hugh Dillon Massy, Col. Mansel, Adjutant-General, &c. were present.

Major-General Wyndham made his half-yearly inspection of the 24th Regt. under the command of Major Stoyte, at Kilkenny, on Friday last. The gallant General expressed his approbation of the general appearance of the Regt. the precision of their movement and steadiness, in the most flattering terms.

Friday, Major-General Sir Guy Campbell inspected the local companies of the Pensioners at Boyle, and immediately after proceeded to inspect the 38th Depot under Major Storks. Sir Guy Campbell was accompanied by his son Lieut. Campbell, 60th (Aid-de-Camp), and Major Walpole of the Rifle Brigade, who all dined at the officers mess that evening.

The pensioners enrolled in Carlow appeared for the first time in full uniform on Monday, under command of Lieut. Hoey, Staff Officer. While marching on parade one of the pensioners fell and sustained a bad fracture of the thigh.

The local companies (Pensioners) under Captain Browne, at Cork, were inspected on Saturday, in the Barrack-yard, by Major-General Turner.

The Liverpool corps of Pensioners, 300 strong, under Capt. Greig, have formed an excellent band of 16 performers, out of their body.

When these benevolent and most useful men first came to Limerick, there were but three members of their community in the city, having care of 400 boys—They now have 10 members superintending, and 1200 children under their care, while they expect, in a short time, to receive another addition of four Brothers, and about 500 children—making, in all, 14 members, and 1700 pupils.

The Rev. T. L. M'Donnell, R.C.C., Listowel, has been removed to Lixnaw, a contiguous parish, and is succeeded in Listowel by the Rev. Mr. Cotter. The former was presented with a purse of thirty sovereigns on leaving.

Miss Collis, of Dingle, has entered the convent in that town.
