TO JOHN CHRISTY, ESQ. ADARE.

SIR, I HAVE read, with much surprise, in the LIMERICK CHRONICLE of the 30th inst. the following "Resolution" purporting to have been adopted at a meeting of the Parishioners of Adare, convened by the Churchwardens, and honored by your presence as Chairman. "Resolved—That the Rev. SAMUEL LEONARD having stated from the pulpit, that his parishioners had by an Address (which has since appeared in the newspapers) expressed their approval of his conduct in a matter to which he alluded in his last sermon. We feel it but just, and our bounden duty to state publicly that we entirely disapprove of his conduct in that matter. That we do not believe there are three families in the parish that have not expressed the same opinion."

I shall not venture to analyse the motives which induced you, Sir, to place yourself in the very equivocal position of Chairman at such a meeting, neither shall I give any opinion on the kindly feeling and good taste which prompted this unusual proceeding, but as I had the honor of presenting to our late Pastor the well merited address in question, I have been reluctantly compelled to notice the extraordinary counterpoise which this 'respectable' meeting has cast into the opposite scale. I was present when the Rev. Mr. Leonard preached his farewell Sermon, and can not only assert from personal knowledge, but prove by indubitable evidence, that he did not make the statement imputed to him; nor introduce any peculiar matter on which the approval or disapproval of his parishioners might be publicly expressed; and as to what all the families in the parish but three, might think on the subject of your animadversion, it would require something more than your "belief" to make any rational person conclude that they coincided with the general and unfettered opinion which you have published concerning an important particular of your Minister's conduct, especially where there exists on the opposite side the honest expression of gratitude and approval from one hundred and forty individuals who were incapable of being influenced by unworthy motives.

But I now call upon you, the Chairman of this important meeting to answer me. By what authority did the Churchwardens convene the people without the consent or even knowledge of the Vicar, (the Rev. Mr. Croker) who ought in any legally convened assemblage of the kind to have occupied the chair, and I ask would you have ventured to propose the resolution in question had that gentleman been present? I require you to state where the meeting was held, and did the number present much exceed thirty persons? By whose suggestion and under whose patronage did you assemble? The Churchwardens could not in their official capacity, and dared not as private individuals summon such a meeting? Were you present at Adare Church, and listening to Mr. Leonard's sermon? I have every reason to believe you were not, neither were others who joined in endeavouring thus impotently, to cast a stigma on a clergyman who had laboured amongst them for nearly fourteen years, and whose character the breath of calumny had never before tainted. I demand of you and your auxiliaries in this unchristian warfare to state fully, and without reserve, the "matter" concerning which the Rev. Mr. Leonard has incurred your heavy displeasure. I ask you to specify distinctly the language objected to in his sermon, and then the public shall have an opportunity of comparing it with the written discourse.

You have advanced, as a plea for this aggressive proceeding, your feelings of "justice" and "bounden duty"—rest assured, Sir, that the public will judge of such matters not by feelings but by facts, not by assertions but by proofs. They know well that self interest often clothes itself in the reputable garb of duty, and that under its unhalloved influence "judgment is turned away backward and justice standeth afar off; for truth is fallen in the streets and equity cannot enter." SCARIFF UNION. AT a numerous meeting of the BOARD of GUARDIANS of the above Union, held on Tuesday, the 29th day of October, 1844, GEORGE O'CALLAGHAN, Esq. of Maryfort, in the Chair. It was proposed by SIMON G. PURDON, Esq. and seconded by PHILIP READE, Esq. AND RESOLVED UNANIMOUSLY, That the Board having taken into their serious consideration the 41st Article of the rules of the Poor Law Commissioners, by which the control of some of the most important Officers is indirectly taken from the Boards of Guardians, the principle of which rule this Board considers would be destructive of the efficient working of the Poor Law establishments. This Board disclaiming any wish, or intention of withdrawing, or lessening those superintending powers, which they deem fit and expedient, should be entrusted to the Poor Law Commissioners, and actuated by this feeling, as also desirous not to put this Institution into the difficult position, which the present state of its funds, and of the establishment generally, would be placed in, by any sudden resignation of their duties, do earnestly protest against said order, and urgently request that same may be re-considered and modified by the Commissioners, so as to render it consistent with the continued exercise of those duties, which the law has imposed on this Board—And that this resolution shall be forwarded to the Commissioners, and that their answer shall be taken into consideration on the next general day of meeting, which will be on this day month.
