

The remains of the late Arthur Gloster, Esq. of Moylish, near this city, whose wanton and barbarous murder we detailed in our last, were borne from his late residence on Thursday, at ten o'clock, and interred in the family burial place, St. Munchin's Church. The melancholy event brought together a number of relatives and friends, beside many respectable individuals, some of them personally unknown to the unfortunate gentleman, but who attended the funeral, to mark their horror and detestation of the atrocious deed, which consigned the son of an old and respectable citizen to an untimely end. The body was preceded by a group of female domestics and tenants, in white cloaks, scarfs, and handbands, and the following clergymen:—Rev. Messrs. Knox, Moore, Jacob, and Scott. The principal mourners were the three brothers of deceased, James and George Gloster, Esqrs. and Capt. Richard Gloster, late 61st. The private carriages of Sir R. Franklin, Alderman Watson, Messrs. Bruce, Hunt, Gabbett, Finch, Lloyd, Bernard, Boyse, Wallnut, Caswell, Shine, Adamson, Dr. Lyons, O'Farrell, Piercy, Bowles, Carey, Trousdell, &c. were also in attendance, and a concourse of respectable pedestrians. The solemn funeral service of the Church of England was read by the Rev. Mr. Knox, and Rev. Mr. Jacob, in a most impressive manner. The funeral was conducted by Charles James and Son.

The late Mr. Gloster, who thus fell a victim to secret assassins, had been on the fatal day to Kilkishen Sessions, for the sole purpose of communicating with Mr. Boyd, surveyor, of Clare, upon an intended road through his property at Toonagh, and after amicably settling a dispute between two of the tenants on the land, left in a gig, for Limerick, never imagining the blood-hounds that tracked his route, until he felt the mortal gun-shot wounds, which perforated his heart. Wednesday last, as his remains passed along the road from Kilkishen, in a funeral coach, the peasantry, in the fields, turned off from their work of potatoe-digging, to cheer and exult at the savage death of a fellow-creature. What a sad picture of our fallen condition was this fiendish triumph of Irish magnanimity over a murdered fellow-creature! The late Arthur Gloster, with a sentiment of filial piety honorable to his character, willed £1000, to erect a Cenotaph in Munchin's churchyard, over the remains of his deceased parent, George Gloster, Esq. His other property, except a legacy of £500 to Mr. Beauchamp, Attorney, is devised as we stated on Wednesday, to his sister for life, and her issue, in the event of marriage, otherwise the reversion will be to the Episcopal Asylum Chapel.

The head-quarters 69th, at Monins, arrived at Templemore on the 5th inst.

Assistant-Surgeon Gray has returned to Templemore, from leave of absence. New barracks are ordered to be erected at perary, capable of holding a force of 1000 men.

Additional barrack accommodation is being provided at Board of Ordnance at Haulbowline Island powder magazine, Cove. Major Trollope, 36th, has returned on leave of absence to 31st Dec. Capt. R. is in command of the two companies that are to be sent to the depot.
