fourteen years of efficient and active service; or to use your own words, the address was in truth and reality "an expression of approval of Mr. Leonard's character and zeal as a faithful Clergyman of long standing in the diocese." Now we do not think it strange that his Clerical brethren should thus express their opinion of his general conduct in the Ministry without reference to any peculiar feature of moral discipline in a disputed case; nor do we deem ourselves in the slightest degree accountable for a perversion of our meaning by any person whether interested or not.

We have inquired of Mr. Wilson and he has authorised us to state that in the paragraph which has given you offence, he had not the remotest intention of alluding to the difficult and delicate matter between Mr. Leonard and Lord Dunraven. Indeed on carefully considering that passage, we are surprised that you should have understood it as you did.

Under these circumstances we may well most firmly and unhesitatingly deny the existence of any grounds for the serious charge which you have brought against us.

We feel it is not our province to question your right of forming an opinion on any subject; but in the absence of our respect for each other, we must express our regret that you, having already borne your testimony to the general character of Mr. Leonard's Ministry for fourteen years, should have volunteered so sweeping a sentence of condemnation of any particular line of conduct, which he may conscientiously have thought himself bound to adopt. Your information must necessarily have been limited; and we think under such circumstances there were strong grounds for hesitation, before you ventured to deliver your own opinion *ex Cathedra*, or to pronounce *without authority* on behalf of many of your brother Clergymen.

That you should have desired to maintain a character for consistency in the eyes even of one individual is quite right; but that this should have caused you to merge higher feeling, and led you to the course which you adopted is, to say the least, *inconsistent* with what we expected from you as a friend and Minister.

I have now done with Mr. Christy, and shall leave him to digest as he best can, the agreeable reflections which must exist in his mind, when he remembers the part he has acted in this unpoplar crusade against his late minister.
