TO THE EDITOR Of the Limerick Chronicle.

SIR,
AN Editorial Article in the Irish Railway Gazette
alluding to a Limerick and Ennis Railway, adver-
tised in its columns, assures the public—
1stly—That the applications for shares exceed the
whole number to be allotted—and
2ndly—That the inhabitants of Limerick and Clare
are most interested in the undertaking.

The first allegation, if true, is surprising—No office
in connexion with this speculation has been opened in
Limerick or Ennis, nor is it known in either place that
a single share has been applied for.

The second allegation is even still more startling—
the list of the provisional committee does not include
the name of even one inhabitant of Limerick or Clare
merchant—an omission the more remarkable, when the
greatness of the traffic already existing between
Limerick and Ennis is considered. Can it be that
these parties have been forgotten; or is it that they
have been too cautious to be caught?

That the Clare and Limerick people are anxious to
establish a Railway is undoubted; it is a measure of
too vast importance to their interest to be neglected; but
those interests are too highly appreciated to be hastily
committed to any hands that may offer to take charge
of them, and besides it is well known that active mea-
sures have been for some time in progress to combine
the landed and commercial interests of Clare and Limer-
rick in the formation of a company which at a cost
much less than that announced by the paper project in
the Railway Gazette shall extend to the district the
fullest advantages of Railway intercourse, and give that
guarantee for stability and success which can only be
afforded by the presence of the managing parties to
the confidence of the public—a title which will be
strengthened by the fact that they have deemed it ne-
cessary to survey the line before they advertise it, re-
membering the adage "the more haste the less speed."
