**DEATH OF HOLWELL WALSH, Esq.**—It is with sincere regret we have to announce the death of Holwell Walsh, Esq. Barrister-at-law, at his residence, Lower Gardiner-street, Dublin, on Sunday last. His name is quite sufficient to excite the admiration and sympathy of his countrymen. Mr. Walsh was, in the commencement of his career, a most distinguished member of the above honourable profession, and for some years practised as leading counsel on the Munster circuit. At Nisi Prius, he is allowed by general consent to have made the most signally great and decisive impression ever known at the Irish bar, in a suit which then enlisted the attention of all circles in and out of Dublin. His address upon that occasion, displaying talent and genius of the highest order, almost electrified the bench and court, and deservedly won him the highest celebrity as a forensic orator. We are not quite sure that he adopted the assiduity and tact of others, in the profession, to advance his fame; possibly he disliked, from a too strict or nice a feeling to court expedients, but nothing could ever deprive him of the high place he held as an advocate, a lawyer, and a gentleman.

On Saturday night last an armed and disguised party entered the house of Mr. William O'Farrell, of West Moig, Pallaskenry, late of this city, and demanded his gun, which he registered last sessions, and which he was obliged to deliver up to them. When they went out they fired a shot and then went off, after first warning the inmates of the house not to make any alarm.

On Christmas day, between one and two o'clock, three fellows armed, one with a gun and the other two with a blunderbuss, disguised in garments of shreds and patches, forced an entrance into the office of the Kilbricken mines, three miles from Ennis. Having entered by the back door, they kept watch upon the servant-maid, who was the only inmate, with the exception of a boy, and one of the parties forced open the desk, ransacked every enclosure in the house, and took away two guns. To show that money was not their object, they broke every box and chest in their search for arms.

Saturday last, ten men armed attacked the house of a farmer named Storin, at Aherina, near Doonass, on the estate of Col. Wyndham, beat himself and his son, and swore if they did not quit the tenement, they would return in a few days, and murder both!

On Friday night, William Stapleton, of Lorha, heard some persons pulling off the thatch off his house, when he made a stab of a pitchfork through the part, at the same time, ordering his son to light a candle. Stapleton discovered his brother-in-law, Michael Phelan outside, armed with a pistol, the contents of which he lodged in the body of John Stapleton, who fell to the ground and died.
