The parishioners of St. Michan, Dublin, have presented affectionately grateful addresses to the Rev. Mr. Shore, and Rev. Mr. Macdonnell, curates of that extensive parish for several years, upon their recent removal by the Rector, Rev. Mr. Stanford. Rev. Mr. Shore has been a zealous friend of the Protestant Orphan Society. Rev. Mr. Macdonnell is brother of Dr. Macdonnell, Senior Fellow of Trinity College.

The Rev. Solomon Frost, late a Roman Catholic Priest of this diocese, having completed a course of Church of England Theological reading, under the superintendance of the Rev. Mr. Naugle, at Achill, has been appointed to a curacy in the diocese of Chester.

On the memorial of the Rev. Peter Conway, R. C. curate, Westport, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant has been pleased to commute the sentence of transportation on nine men, found guilty at Mayo assizes of manslaughter, to two years imprisonment.

Lord Shrewsbury took the chair at a crowded meeting of the Roman Catholic Institute of Great Britain on Tuesday, at Freemasons' Hall, London, for the purpose of extending its operations. Dr. Wiseman and nine other R. C. prelates attended. It was stated that out of 24,000 R. C. children in London but 6000 are educated. The Hon. Charles Clifford, in proposing a resolution, said he regretted to have to announce that her Majesty had lately deemed it expedient that he should retire from an office he held in the county in which he resided, for he was the only Catholic landed proprietor in that county; but that fact should not lessen his desire for the advancement of his religion.

The Roman Catholics of Edinburgh presented the Rev. Dr. Milne, of Dublin, at the conclusion of his Lent lectures, a beautiful and costly writing case, silver mounted, and fully furnished; also a superb copy of Frazer Tytler's history of Scotland—the thistle and shamrock elegantly wrought upon both.

Rt. Rev. Dr. Murphy, Rev. Mr. Mackay, and Rev. Mr. Ryan, arrived at Sydney, New South Wales, from Liverpool, and proceeded to Port Phillip, of which colony Dr. Murphy is appointed Bishop. His friends at Sydney presented him a purse of £225 on his departure last October.
