**TO THE EDITOR  
 Of the Limerick**

SIR,  
 I READ a letter in your edit from Mr John Freke Evans, Rathkeale races, which took place On the part of the stewards, myself, I beg to reply to a state incorrect—and will endeavour to “that one story is good until another is proved better.”  
 There were five horses started in the first heat of which was won by the Irish Girl, followed closely by the Lady of Lyons, though some next in order, and last the Fairy.  
 When the Lady of Lyons came to the post she was objected to as distanced: (known to the judge at the distance, 24th Regt.) who stated it was possible to say whether he was in the advantage of a doubt is, I believe, the rules of the turf to the disadvantage of the Lady of Lyons again for the second heat.  
 In about half an hour they all started the second heat with the exception of the Irish Girl the Lady of Lyons with the Wild Irish Girl, and the other horses.  
 The race was well contested between the Honesty and the Humours of the Lady of Lyons was now between the Lady of Lyons and the Wild Irish Girl.  
 The horses being now all distanced, I claim her as the winner—their advantage was sufficient to nullify any objection Evans could produce. The property of Mr. Lindesay, an officer in the 24th Regt.
