much concerned to state, that the prevalent disease of the potato crop has been this week found to have effected fearful ravages to the county Limerick, and in several farms shew unequivocal symptoms of the canker in the potato. At Cahireilly, the first observed, and subsequently at Fedamore, twelve acres were opened, and the spade was left off work on finding the plant was diseased; the evil was also apparent at several other parts of the country, where specimens of the kind was entertained. At Kilmellick, and a wide range of land in the counties of Cork, Limerick and Tipperary, the same apprehensions are felt for the same result. The most exposed to this deadly plague spot is the 'white eye,' for they are most prone to decay, and the disease has fixed on these it may be incurable; not so the cup and crow potatoes, on high ground the farmer has a better chance of success. There is little doubt but the distemper which attacks the potatoe in both countries is the effect of a low atmosphere and excessive moisture, and the plant, since the early part of August, has been the rains set in very heavy. The recent atmosphere and frequent rains, aggravate the disease and infection. This terrible epidemic, threatens loss of food in the present year, and a loss of seed for the next year.—It is recommended to apply the best remedy to the disease, and they are advised in opening the soil for close examination, to separate the healthy from the diseased potato, so as to arrest the contagion; the pits or beds narrow, and mixing more dry soil with the potatoes, if possible to prevent them touching; dry sand, when convenient, is a valuable remedy for this purpose, with a sprinkling of lime. The potatoes being slightly tainted may be eaten by pigs, but these animals will refuse them as they are probably infected with the canker.
