Sergeant Howly opened the Michaelmas Quarter Sessions for Tipperary at Clonmel yesterday.

LIMERICK PROTESTANT ORPHAN SOCIETY.—The usual monthly meeting of this very important charity was held on Tuesday last, and was numerous and respectably attended. The Ven. Henry Irwin, Arch-deacon of Emly, in this county, presided, and much business was transacted. Two gentlemen and three persons in business were granted apprentices, and a gratuity was awarded to a female orphan, who had creditably served out the full term of her apprenticeship. The death of an orphan boy, rescued from great peril, was reported to the Committee. He had been in delicate health when admitted, early in the present year, and every possible spiritual and temporal benefit had been since conferred upon him, through the agency of this Society; and when he was called to the home purchased by the Saviour's precious blood, the last act of christian fellowship was performed in the decent interment of his mortal remains. Thus, throughout life and in death, this valuable charity embodies the principles, and reflects the pure and benevolent splendour of the religion of Christ upon the whole body, even to its lowest, and, therefore, abundantly honored members; and, through the devoted agency of this Society, the feeblest invalid and the retired student may bear an equal part in every work of faith with the robust and active members of the church, and experience in their hearts the fulfilment of the Lord's words, "It is more blessed to give than to receive." The Treasurer's report shewed a balance against the Society at the close of the day of £150. To prevent this weighty advance falling too heavily on the lay gentleman who so ably and kindly manages the financial department, and like the other officers, gratuitously also; another officer of the Society lent the institution last month, in the most handsome manner, the sum of one hundred pounds—all of which, it is earnestly hoped, by the blessing of God, who so greatly prospers the cause of the orphan and the widow, will be paid off by the exertions of the excellent Ladies whose public sale commences on Wednesday se'nnight, the 22d inst., and which will be formally announced in the next *Chronicle*.

DEATH OF SIR RICHARD FRANKLIN, M. D.
The grievous calamity which it has become our painful duty to announce by the startling line which heralds this sad obituary, most sincerely and unreservedly we deplore, in mournful sympathy with every class of our fellow-citizens, who must contemplate the unexpected death of Sir Richard Franklin, a professional gentleman of high repute and considerable practice in every family circle, as a great public loss; while his own household, and those who knew him intimately in social life, will long have to lament the fondest and most affectionate of relatives, the kindest and most obliging of friends. Sir Richard Franklin died at his residence, George's-street, this morning, at 10 o'clock, of fever, contracted in the arduous and almost incessant exercise of his medical pursuits, after little more than a week's confinement, during which critical period the many anxious inquiries hourly made from all quarters of the city, for one so universally esteemed, were quite sufficient to indicate the high public opinion of his character as a physician, a private gentleman, and a magistrate. His personal exertions and influence were devoted with advantage to every local charity and institution, and in the midst of all his engagements, professional or public, upon no occasion was the efficient and zealous advocacy of Sir Richard Franklin found wanting by any portion of his fellow-citizens. The tone of his feelings was naturally quick, ardent, and energetic, with a high sense of honor, well becoming the position he filled in society; his manners were courteous, bland, and captivating—the qualities of both mind and person in such unison as to evince the perfect gentleman in every walk of his short but useful career. In the close and frequent intercourse of physician and patient, there was an air of tender solicitude so natural; a degree of affectionate interest in his every word, look, and attitude, so kind and gentle as to win the entire confidence of the sickly sufferer, and often soothe the murmurs of complaint, when nurse and medicine had failed of relief.

"Opiferque per orbem dicor."
Sir Richard Franklin filled the office of Mayor of Limerick in 1839; he was a Magistrate of the City, and Alderman of Richmond Ward, beside Physician to all the local hospitals, and an active member of every public institution. In fact there was no establishment where intelligence, energy, and talent was required to which Sir Richard Franklin did not contribute his time and assistance. The labouring poor of Limerick deeply deplore the premature death of their friend and physician, who gratuitously administered both day and night to the bed of sickness, in the abode of misery and destitution, and often has he been the foremost by his own example to promote a benevolent subscription for their wants. Sir Richard Franklin has left a most amiable wife and seven children in a state of mental distress at this overwhelming bereavement, which it would be almost cruel to advert to. Their private sorrows are sacred from what might be deemed intrusion, however kindly meant, and must not be hastily disturbed. Providence which inflicted the death-blow, can only repair, or in mercy soften the effects of the direful visitation.

The mortal remains of Sir Richard Franklin will be interred on Saturday next, in the family vault, at St. John's church. Sir Richard was in his 44th year.

Mrs. Head, the wife of the Dean of Killaloe, returning on Monday evening to the house of her son-in-law, was seized with an apoplectic fit, and died deeply regretted within a few hours. She was daughter of the late General Darby, of the 54th Regiment.
