WATERFORD AND LIMERICK RAILWAY .- The Jury. whose names appeared in our last, were occupied since Saturday, investigating the claims of Mr. Thos. Purcell, proprietor of salt works and a limekilnat Nelson-street, parish of St. Michael, for injury to his premises by the Railway line. The inquiry terminated last evening, when the jury awarded the claimant £1,400 damages It is the intention of claimant to appeal to the award. from this city, and at whose approach the insurgents cautiously reduced their outlying scouts, but still kept firm possession of the ground, and distinctly refused to move off. The surrounding hills were covered with people, who begun to conceal their fire-arms, but made a strong show of pitchforks, spades, and shovels. Mr. Tracy advanced quietly within hearing of some of the main body, and stated that it was his duty to order an illegal assemblage of persons like that before him to disperse, and he would be compelled to enforce the law if they did not obey the constituted authorities-that he die not come there to serve ejectment processes, but to preject the peace from hostile demonstration. This explanatory remonstrance induced some of the crowds to retire, but many held on, and would not stir, until Mr. Tracy had twice read the riot act, and a third time was doing so, when the Police and Military advanced at the charge, and the whole multitude retreated before them, some quickly, others slowly and reluctantly, whilst more at a distance were seen wielding in defiance their farm implements, and shouting to their friends and before the military "steady—keep your places." Having cleared the ground of the insurgents, who dispersed in various directions, fortunately without a collision, military and police. after about an hour's halt, returned to garrison at seven in the evening, having brought in with them three prisoners, Pat. Ryan, John O'Brien, and John Bourke, who had been taken with stones in their hands, shouting and exciting to a riot.

ENGAGEMENT OF THE POLICE AND ROCKITES.

Sunday evening, about 7 o'clock, the Annacotty Police were on the usual sightly patrole, and unexpectedly encountered, at the turn of the road near Lieut.-General Sir Richard Bourke's seat. Thornfield, a cluster of ten or twelve armed men. The police party consisted of one constable and three sub-constables. Before a word was exchanged a close fire was poured in upon the police, who immediately returned it, but the first discharge took effect upon Constable Thos. Comyns, and sub-constable Davis, the former having received a gun shot in the upper region of the chest near his shoulder, where the ball lodged, and the padding of his jacket providentially turned off another ball, which would else have proved fatal. Sub-constable Davis received a shot in the car which perforated the cartilage, and entered behind at his pole, fortunately not wounding a vital part. Another ball struck the front of his cap, and was turned up by the wire plaiting, which most providentially pro-moted its ascent immediately over the forehead, moted its ascent immediately and through the cap. The wounded policemen were notwithstanding this almost desperate condition, able to return the fire of their adversaries again, and those fellows, though more than double the number of the police party, retreated by Ahane, carrying off one of their force, who was heard to fall, and groan, as if wounded in the conflict. The Police found upon the immediate scene of action a heavy loaded pistol, which it is most probable the disabled man had dropped. Sub Constables Beckett and Graham considering that pursuit would be idle, if not imprudent, returned slowly to their barracks at Annacotty, supporting their two wounded and bleeding comrades. When their two wounded and bleeding comrades. the report of this dangerous and unequal contest was brought to town same night, with a request for surgical aid, the City Police, 24, being all that could be spared off duty, repaired in double quick, under Sub-Inspector Brownrigg, to Annacotty and Ahane, when they traversed the country for miles until day light, in search of the armed Rockites, and entered several houses on their route, but in vain, as they found no trace of the gang. Surgeon Lloyd yesterday cut the ball from behind the ear of Sub-Constable Davis, but Constable Comyn continues in a state of great danger, as the ball in his breast has not been extracted Both police were brought into the constabulary barrack yesterday, where they are under professional care.

Perhaps, it was fortunate, in Anacotty police met with the above gang on Sunday night, as it is now credibly supposed they had planned the murder of Ryan, the bailiff, on the Molyneux property at Knocksentry, and were on their fatal mission when the brave though insufficient Police party encountered them.

Laurence Leahy, an industrious farmer, of good circumstances and reputation, was barbarously murdered on Sunday evening last at six o'clock, by five armed men, who entered his house at Ballyneety, adjoining the lands of Drumbany, the estate of Sir Mathew Barrington, and after a desperate struggle with their unfortunate victim, who determined to sell his life dearly, left him as they supposed a mangled corpse on the floor, in the embrace of his distracted wife and eleven children, who in vain implored mercy from the ruthless miscreants, and sought to arrest their murderous hands. The wretched wife and mother, who is far advanced in pregnancy, flung herself upon the body of her wounded husband, when overcome by his assailants, and felled to the earth, after standing two gun shots, and blows from the stocks of guns and pistols that had been discharged at him. The infuriate demons turned upon her next, cut her head in two places while she lay in that prostrate condition, tore her dress, and beat her little children, whose piercing shrieks could not be restrained at the harrowing spectacle before them. David Walsh, the servant boy, who offered to assist his master, was knocked down and severely maltreated, and they almost broke the back of a young boy, the son of poor Leahy, who dared to manifest beyond his years the sympathy and spirit of a man at the outrage beheld. Having consummated this horrible tragedy by sacrificing the husband and father to their savage vengeance, the murderers departed from the happy home which they have made a scene of indescribable misery and desolation, the forlorn widow and helpless orphans clinging to the body with bitter lamentations over those wounds from which the life blood was fast pouring its crimson tide.

The ferocious miscreants on their departure fired a shot, and one of them exultingly said, "he'll take no land again."

Leahy, when raised from the ground, rallied for a short interval, and having recovered his speech, in the presence of his wife and a neighbour, who supported him, was able to state that he knew well two of the gang, (naming them) and that they were in gaol before for the murder of Pat. Shine. Providence mercifully spared the dying man to make this declaration, for he did not survive an hour after. It is a remarkable fact that Mr. Shine, a respectable farmer, who resided little more than a mile from Leahy, was murdered in his house, under almost precisely similar aggravating circumstances, that very day four years.

Patrick Byrnes, and Patrick Hartigan, were arrested on Monday, by the Ballyneety Police, for the murder of Laurence Leahy, and brought into gaol by a detachment of the 83d, who left this garrison for the purpose of assisting the Police escort. These two fellows have been more than 12 months in prison, on strong suspi-

dangerously in in the County Infirmary. According to the testimony of Doctors Wilkinson and Parker, it appeared that Lealiy's right leg was dreadfully fractured, as well by the gun shot wound as by the blows received; he had also two extensive wounds on the head, and one on the nose. Leahy was the father of 11 children, and his wife near her confinement.

The scene on the melancholy occasion of holding the inquest was most heartrending-the shricks and lamentations of his numerous family would pierce the most obdurate breast. Hundreds of the peasantry assembled around the house, but evinced little compassion or commisseration at the horrifying spectacle before them. The Jury returned a verdict of wilful murder. SECOND MURDER.

An awful murder was perpetrated on Monday last, at Anglesborough, in this county, six miles from Mitchelstown, and connected with the letting of land, when a respectable farmer, named Lynch, was shot dead on the public road, and within 20 yards of his dwelling, at mid-day. Mr. Knaresborough, S.M. Major Hill, 54th, Dr. Phelan, and the Police, were in a few hours on the spot, when the corpse of the murdered man presented an awful appearance, having four wounds in the body. The shots were heard by his family and neighbours, and the assassins were seen running off. It was a heart-rending sight to witness the sorrow of his bereaved widow and her orphan children. The Police of the district cautioned him about his farm, as he was a marked man t and it is only a short time since Sub-Inspector Burke and his party were secreted in Lynch's house all night, from information gained by that active officer and his Constable, Lodge, that a plot was made to attack and murder the unfortunate man.

The lands of Drumbanny, were traversed on Monday night, by an armed gang of ruffians, who visited the cottages of those farmers in the neighbourhood of the scene of Leahy's murder the evening before, and threatened every person who they suspected could give information of the perpetrators of that foul deed.

The house of Mr. Mat. Larkin, at Drumbanny, was not visited or attacked by an armed party, the same night, as reported in town.

At Kishyquirk, within a few miles of this city, the houses of the following farmers, all tenants of the Earl of Clare, in that district, were attacked by armed men on Friday night, and who took a gun each from William Donnelly, Thomas Collopy, Thomas Collopy (William), Patrick Lynch, and John Finucane. The same marauders attacked the houses of John Collopy, Thomas Fitzgerald, and Mathew Bourke, also tenants of Lord Clare, but did not succeed in their search for arms. They found an old gun with John Welsh, of Cloghnadromin, but left it behind as unserviceable.

Sunday evening at an early hour, a Rock notice was affixed to Peafield house, near this city, the residence of Mr. William Roche, threatening him with Captain Rock's vengeance, unless he remits the rent of potatoe ground which he had set at 30s. an acre under the general rate, and subsequently reduced 40s. the acre; but this was not sufficient. Mr. Roche gives liberal and constant employment in the neighbourhood at 1s. a day to farm labourers, beside food, yet such is his reward

On Monday night, the house of John Conners, at Dunmoyalan, near Shanagolden, a tenant to the Earl of Clare, was attacked, and the proprietor very severely beaten, and ordered to give up land he had lately taken.

Every night and morning shots are firing at both sides of the river, at Castleconnell and Doonass, to the terror of the families of those gentlemen residing in the

A few evenings ago, a party of armed fellows knocked at the residence of Mrs. Brown, at O'Brien's-bridge, (within a few yards of the Police Barrack,) and left a "Molly Maguire," commanding her son, notice, signed Henry, on pain of death, to give up the collection of the rents on the property of his brother, John Brown, J.P. of Clonboy.

Thursday evening a party of six men entered the house of John Murphy, on the lands of Laharden, county Clare, and beat himself and daughter in a very severe manner, and carried away two guns.

Friday last an armed party came to the house of the Widow Lequire, who resides at Beaah, near Pallaskenry, and demanded fire arms; the widow made answer there were none in the house, however, they made diligent search, but did not find any. Fortunately her son happened to be from home on this night, and the party withdrew after making use of violent threats as did not succeed in making out the gun, which he had returned to a gentleman in the forendon of same day, from whom he obtained it to shoot crows.

Same night an armed party attacked two keepers placed in a farmer's house at Ballysteen, by Darby O'Grady, Esq. in the neighbourhood of Pallaskenry, for non-payment of rent. They were ordered not to for non-payment of rent. They were ordered not to come there any more, or if they did they would certainly meet with immediate death.

Saturday night Constable Flynn, with a party from Pallaskenry, succeeded in arresting a notorious character of the name of Manix, for whose apprehension there were three warrants issued, one for attacking a house, another for appearing in arms, and the third for assaulting the inmates. Mannix was concealed in a turf boat at Ringmoylan quay. This man was on the run for the months, and were it not for the exertions of this efficient Constable, he would have made his escape altogether.

On Monday Sub-constables John Carr and Robert M'Loughlin, of Manister, arrested Patt Walsh, near Tory-hill, and same evening also arrested William M'Keniry near Hospital, a distance of 11 Irish miles, and lodged him in Bruff bridewell. They are both charged on suspicion of the murder of Leighry, at Ballyneety, on the night before. The men arrested are of
