Clare County Meeting.

A Public Meeting held in the Court-House of
 Ennis, on SATURDAY, the 10th day of January,
 1846,
 HUGH P. HICKMAN, Esq. High Sheriff, in the Chair.
 The following resolutions were unanimously adopted:
 Proposed by Cornelius O'Brien, Esq., M.P. and
 seconded by Major Ball:
 Resolved—That the unquestionable failure of the
 Potato crop, the habitual food of three-fourths of the
 people of Ireland, calls for the immediate and energetic
 interposition of the Government.
 Proposed by John Singleton, Esq., and seconded by
 John O'Brien, Esq., M.P. of Carnelly:
 Resolved—That the awful visitation, by which we
 are menaced, can be alone encountered by the exten-
 sive and remunerative employment of the people.
 Proposed by D. J. Wilson, Esq., and seconded by
 William Butler, of Bunmahon, Esq.:
 Resolved—That the reclamation of the waste lands
 of Ireland, the drainage of its saturated soil, and the
 establishment of a competent tribunal in Dublin to fa-
 cilitate the railway projects now in progress, afford
 an obvious and efficient remedy.
 Proposed by W. J. Skerrett, Esq., of Finevara House,
 and seconded by William Smyth, Esq.
 Resolved—That the following Memorial, founded
 on the foregoing resolutions, be forwarded by the High
 Sheriff to his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant:—
 To His Excellency Baron Heytesbury, Lord Lieutenant
 General and General-Governor of Ireland.
 MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,
 That we respectfully submit to your Excellency
 the propriety of adopting immediate measures to pro-
 vide for the employment of the people, in the coming
 months of scarcity, with which we are so awfully men-
 aced by the unquestionable failure in the potato crop.
 That we believe such could not be more effectively
 achieved than, among other necessities, by facilitating
 the progress of the several Irish railway projects about
 being brought under the consideration of Parliament.
 That such would be materially promoted by the
 establishment of some tribunal in Dublin, which could
 adequately discharge the functions of select committees
 of the House of Commons.
 That by such a course, those railways would be in
 progress of execution early in the summer months,
 when the pressure of distress shall commence.
 We also respectfully suggest that, in so doing your
 Excellency would save those companies, and ulti-
 mately the public, heavy and unnecessary expense, and
 would secure to the country its capital, and its profes-
 sional ranks, a just proportion of the national expen-
 diture.
 We also beg leave to submit to your Excellency, in
 furtherance of the important object stated, the relief
 of the people by remunerative employment, the urgent
 necessity which exists for such amendments in the
 Drainage enactment, as shall facilitate and secure its
 more general introduction.
 We trust that your Excellency will recommend to
 her Majesty's Government the adoption of suggestions
 equitable in their character, calculated to meet the me-
 nacing evil by which we are threatened, and sanctioned
 by the concurrence of all parties.
